AAUW Marches With More Than a Million April 25, 2004

On Sunday, April 25, 2004, AAUW members joined the largest women's rights march in history. An estimated 1 million people converged on Washington D.C., to March for Women's Lives in a powerful demonstration of support for a woman's right to reproductive choices and personal freedoms. AAUW members were represented with our delegations' signs and voices.

Mirroring the Washington D.C. March, AAUW California rallied to the steps of the State's Capitol. At 10 a.m. Sunday, April 25, a great crowd of women gathered on the K Street Mall. Organized by Director of Public Policy, Rita Wustner, hundreds of women from the AAUW-CA state convention and surrounding areas marched in Sacramento to the west steps of the Capitol to rally for reproductive freedom. The group was led in chants, "What do we want?" CHOICE! "What do we do?" VOTE! Impassioned remarks stressed the tremendous struggle and decades it took to gain a woman's right to privacy and the freedom to make personal choices.

People across the country are mobilizing a "get out the vote" effort supporting freedom of choice – all choice – at the ballot box. AAUW members are motivating communities by kicking off a Bring the March Home voter education campaign.

AAUW's campaign aims to educate the public about the importance of reproductive rights and to ensure the future of our right to choose by identifying pro-choice voters and ensuring they turn out. The March for Women's Lives showed the nation that the sanctity of reproductive choice is non-negotiable and is an important personal freedom issue. The only way to truly guarantee that the march is not an empty promise is to bring the march home and demonstrate the power of the pro-choice majority at the ballot box.

Extending the enthusiasm and motivation of the March for Women's Lives and as a primary co-sponsor of the event, AAUW's important presence in the pro-choice community is amplified through its leadership in local activities. With a long and proud tradition of supporting women's rights and freedom of choice, AAUW members are again a leader of today's important issues.

How do you Bring the March Home?

- 1. Get Connected: Form a local working group and gather the talents of your Branch and your community.
- 2. Get the Word Out: Open a discussion about reproductive rights, what it means to have choice, and how to protect our freedom to choose.
- 3. Get Active: Launch a voter registration drive and mobilize registered voters to go to the polls.

AAUW Supports New Hate Crime Legislation

As one of this nations' oldest civil rights organizations, the American Association of University Women (AAUW) has been at the forefront of the struggle to end crimes. AAUW strives to stop discrimination and violence of all forms, especially when crimes are motivated by a person's gender, race, religion, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or disability status.

We applaud Senator Edward Kennedy, Congressman John Conyers, and Congresswoman Ileana Ros-Lehtinen for their bold leadership in introducing into legislation in their respective chambers: the Local Law Enforcement Enhancement Act (SB 966) and Local Law Enforcement Hate Crimes Prevention Act (H.R. 4204). With 174 co-sponsors on the House bill and 49 co-sponsors of the Senate bill representing both parties, these bills construct a bipartisan bridge over the ignorance and fear that perpetuates bias-motivated violence.

While the existing hate-crimes law that was enacted after the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., has done much to fight bias-motivated violence, it is unfortunately out of date since it does not recognize gender, sexual orientation, and disability based violence and acts of discrimination. Because of these important changes, the passage of these bills is particularly significant to AAUW because they expand the definition of hate crimes to these additional and equally unacceptable acts of violence that were not in the original legislation.

Since the attacks on the World Trade Center and the Pentagon on September 11th, America has seen a rise in violence based on bigotry and harmful stereotypes. These help to strengthen the federal response to such violence by expanding federal jurisdiction to hate crimes. While states should continue to play the primary role in prosecution of crime violence, it is essential that the federal government be given authority act on cases that local authorities are either unable or unwilling to investigate and prosecute.

AAUW supports the work Senator Kennedy, Representative Conyers and Representative Ros-Lehtinen efforts to pass this much needed legislation.

Log onto the website http://capwiz.com/aauw/home/, read the AAUW stance, and contact your elected officials. Current issues that need you to take action:

- Support Nontraditional Students in Higher Education Senator Hillary Rodham Clinton (D-NY) has introduced the,
 "Non-Traditional Students Success Act" (S.2360) in the Senate and Representative Rush Hold (D-NJ) has introduced
 the "Part-Time Student Assistance Act" (H.R.3968) in the House. The Act includes increasing Pell Grants and
 expanding the percentage of the Lifetime Learning tax credit.
- Support Fair Pay The Paycheck Fairness Act (S. 76/H.R. 1688) is a step in the struggle to give working women the equitable compensation they rightfully deserve. This important legislation, introduced by Senator Tom Daschle (D-SD) and Congresswoman Rosa DeLauro (D-CT), is aimed at closing the wage gap.
- Support Responsible Reproductive Policy To coincide with the March for Women's Lives, the co-chairs of the Congressional Pro-Choice Caucus Reps. Louise Slaughter (D-NY), Diana DeGette (D-CO), Jim Greenwood (R-PA), and Nancy Johnson (R-CT) introduced the "Putting Prevention First Act (PPFA)" in the House on April 21. Sen. Harry Reid (D-NV) introduced the bill in the Senate on April 22 (S. 2336). Putting Prevention First Act (PPFA) is a comprehensive family planning effort intended to focus on preventing unwanted pregnancy.
