The Public Policy Committee will resume meeting on Wednesday, September 20, 2006, at 1:30 PM at my home, 13040 Del Monte Drive 45C, Seal Beach. We will discuss the Propositions that will appear on the November ballot at our September and October meetings. Twelve have already been approved by the Secretary of State and no more that require signature verification can be submitted. However, the Legislature can propose ballot measures until the latter part of August. I know there is at least one that has a good possibility of passing, but hopefully there will be no more.

Welcome to AAUW's 2006-2007 year!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for electing me as your president. Acting as president is going to be a real challenge for me because I am hard of hearing. It is something I have struggled with all my life.

When I was nine months old, I was walking and talking. Shortly thereafter, I came down with whooping cough. I nearly died. I recovered, but did not walk or talk until I was two years old. I had difficulty learning to read since I could not hear the words. Refusing to read, the teacher had me sit in the corner. This was at a time long before agencies tested and helped children with developmental problems. No one knew what was wrong with me. Because of the severity of my hearing loss, there weren't hearing aides powerful enough to help me. It wasn't until 2001 that I got my first hearing aides. I am now learning to speak better since I now hear more. I also have an ALD (Assistive Listening Device), called an R-31, that I wear over my hearing aides to help me hear better. I want to hear everything you say as I feel that what you say is important. You will need to get my attention by tapping me on the shoulder instead of calling my name from behind me. I do best with face-to-face conversations. I look forward to serving you and together we can make it happen!

EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION

Long Beach, (CA) Branch Research & Projects Grant

The AAUW Educational Foundation (EF) has several types of grants and fellowships which are awarded to eligible women scholars. One type of grant is the Research and Projects grant, which is awarded to women who are re-entering the work force, changing their career, or advancing an existing career. The grants are also given to women seeking ways to help their communities with specific projects that promote educational equity for women and girls. Seed money is provided to AAUW branches, states, and individual women for non-degree research and other projects.

The newest grant established by the Long Beach Branch is the Long Beach (CA) Branch Research & Projects Grant. When the grant is completed, it will be in the amount of \$75,000. The branch has 10 years to complete funding the grant; to date the branch has contributed \$12,625.00. A realistic goal is to contribute \$7500.00 per year for 10 years. Let's see how much we can contribute this year! The deadline for branch contributions to EF is December 1.


