# An Uplifting Look at Education

Raquel Sanchez and Jeane Caveness Co-Program Vice-Presidents Saturday February 7, 2015

Natalie Sartin, lecturer in the Department of Africana Studies, California State University, Long Beach (CSULB), is the featured speaker at the next meeting of the Long Beach branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW). Sartin's topic is: "Lifting as We Climb": The Relevance of the Critical Methods and Approaches of the Late Nineteenth Century Black Woman Activist to Educators Today.

Her doctoral dissertation looks at two Black women activists of the late 19th century, Anna Julia Cooper and Frances E. W. Harper, who employed several critical methods and approaches in their task of imparting skills for the regeneration of the Black

race. This is otherwise known as "racial uplift." Sartin argues for the relevance of these approaches to current educational leaders--how work by Cooper and Harper can inform pedagogical models of teaching African American students today. She will also point out how this work relates to the importance of culturally relevant education for other underrepresented minority students. In addition, the presentation celebrates the power and passion of these pioneering women.

The AAUW meeting will be held at Grace First Presbyterian Church, 3955 N. Studebaker Rd, Long Beach, CA 90808 beginning with a social at 9:30 a.m. and includes a business meeting at 10:00. The program will begin at 11:00 a.m. followed by lunch at noon. See back page for reservation information.

### **Board Briefs:**

Regular board business was transacted at the November and December Executive Committee meetings. The following motion was approved by the Executive Committee at the December meeting:

By direction of the Finance Committee, Pat Ferrer moved that the \$83,000 in the Endowment Fund be rolled over into two, one-year Certificates of Deposit at One West Bank. \$33,000 would remain as the Endowment Fund. \$50,000 would be returned to its source, the Building Fund. All accumulated interest should be moved to the Endowment Holding Fund in the Bank of America checking account. Motion passed.

In January, we were inspired by **President Jane Close Connelly**, first woman president of CSULB, the Alma Mater of many of us. She chose as her topic "From Token Ineffectual to President" showing how women may begin careers as "the token woman", but can also rise to the occasion by team playing, persistence and tenacity--all qualities that most women have.

In Washington D.C. the new 2015 Congress begins it's work. The Senate has only 20 women members- out of 100. ## **EO Grant Recipients**



Our final two Long Beach endowment recipients for 2014-2015 receive interest money from the Ethel Black, completed in 2001, and the Long Beach Branch, Inc. endowment completed in 2008. Because only the interest money from the endowments is used to fund fellow-ships and grants, the endowments will last in perpetuity. The 2014-2015 recipients of funds from the Long Beach Research and Projects Grants are the following:



**Elizabeth Marasciulo**, studying under the Ethel Black endowment, is a Career Development grant recipient working towards a certificate in Allied Health at Edmonds Community College in Lynnwood, Washington. She hopes to become an emergency room technician and also works as an advocate for women attempting to remove themselves from domestic violence situations; she herself is a survivor. She provides resources such as shelter, counseling, and medical services so women and their families can remain safe during this dangerous transition. She has a degree in computer programming, a growing field where women are underrepresented. She finds that writing code, like writing poetry or prose,

has an elegance all its own.

**Roxanne Lee**, recipient of monies from the Long Beach Branch, Inc. endowment, is also a Career Development grant recipient. She is studying for a Masters in Landscape Architecture at the University of Washington in Seattle. Her projects focus on working with diverse communities to create meaningfully shared public spaces that encourage active participation between neighbors, environmental stewardship, outdoor play, and exploration for all ages. Her goal is to shape a healthy and diverse environment for people as well as animals, birds and insects.

## **<u>Recognizing AAUW's incredible</u>** <u>Title IX work</u>

The Title IX Champion award celebrates the vital Title IX advocacy work of AAUW supporters across the country. In the 40

years since Title IX was passed, AAUW members and supporters have done amazing work to promote gender equity in education. They have investigated Title IX compliance, cheered on women athletes, supported educators who called for fairness, lobbied for equitable school policies, and helped teach students, parents, educators, coaches, and administrators about the law's requirements. We have much more work ahead of us to fulfill Title IX's promise, and AAUW Title IX champions inspire us to press on!

As a senior staff attorney at the California Women's Law Center, Cacilia Kim has made a career out of championing Title IX. Together with fellow Title IX Champion Elizabeth Kristen, Kim represented student athletes who sued the Sweetwater Union High School District in California for violating Title IX. In 2012, a trial judge held that the school district had failed to provide equal athletic opportunities for female students. The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals later upheld the ruling. Says nominator Sharon Westafer, "Cacilia works tirelessly to make sure women and girls have a fair chance."


# **AAUW Programs**
