Suzie Price, Long Beach 3rd District Councilwoman, is a community advocate and leader. In just over one year in office Councilwoman Price has made a name for herself as a leader who listens and takes action. As a member of the City Council she is Chair of the Public Safety Committee, Vice Chair of the Economic Development Committee and Finance Committee, Vice Chair of the Tidelands and Harbor Committee and member of the Budget Oversight Committee.

Councilwoman Price focuses on important issues, which are the bedrock for a strong community. Issues such as education, anti-bullying, small business, and city infrastructure drive her to actively lead and participate as a dedicated change agent. Her accomplishments include: an Anti-Bullying workshop for our youth, Sunday hours at the Bay Shore Public Library, and a small business workshop. Current programs include 100 new community watch groups by July 2015 and hosting a Cyber

Bullying workshop for our youth. She also believes in bringing the community together with fun family events, which she attends with her husband and two sons. Still she finds time to be an active PTA member at her sons' elementary and middle schools.



Councilwoman Price has served as a Senior Deputy District Attorney for over 15 years. She's a graduate of CSULB with a B.A. in Political Science and a Masters in Public Policy and Administration. During her undergraduate studies she served as the ASB President. She graduated with Distinction and was selected "1996 Outstanding Graduate from the college of Health and Human Services." In 1999 she graduated from Santa Clara University Law School with a Juris Doctorate degree. As an adjunct professor at CSU East Bay Hayward, she served as project manager for a technology grant entitled "Information On-Ramps for Oakland," where

she supervised a team of college students who worked with local organizations to provide computer education and job skills to underprivileged Oakland residents.

Councilwoman Price will share her advocacy experience in understanding, developing and implementing solutions. Her website says it best, "Bringing imaginative Leadership to the 3rd District."

## Long Beach Human Trafficking Task Force

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The Task Force is made up over fifty organizations including faith-based groups, local, state, and federal government offices, concerned citizens and organizations that serve the needs of victims/survivors of human trafficking. At each meeting, the group begins with introductions and an organization highlight, then breaks into four groups: Prevention, Prosecution, Protection, and Human Trafficking 101 (where you learn the basics of human trafficking).

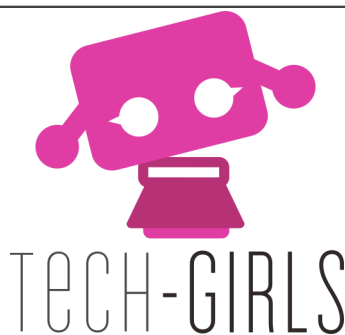
I attended the Prevention meeting where we are planning for the Youth Exploitation and Safety Symposium (YESS). This event will be held at LBCC Liberal Arts Campus on February 20, 2016. In conjunction with YESS, the Task Force will be holding a training during the December meeting that plans out how an organization and individual can best assist a human trafficking victim in any situation. There will be a focus on how to help victims that come forth during YESS; last year there were several. Also, the Task Force is working to enforce SB-1193. It is a law that stipulates that certain businesses (motels, massage parlors, etc.) must publicly display a poster explaining the warning signs of human trafficking.

Regular Board business was conducted at the September Executive Committee meeting. The following motions were made and approved:

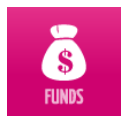
