President's Message

We're halfway through our branch's fiscal year and JoAnn Kuroda and her 2016-2017 Nomination Committee are seeking elected officers for next year. So for those of you seriously considering a position and others of you interested in branch operations, I'd like to share with you how active your board has been in strengthening the operations of the branch both to ensure our members' engagement in advancing equity for women and girls and to simplify as much as possible the responsibilities of future officers.

First though, I'd like to acknowledge and congratulate Cacilia Kim and Sharon Westafer as our

Presidents—Elect for 2015-2016 and to thank them for joining our Board.

Leah Sakacs, Parliamentarian, shared with you last month that we are updating our bylaws and aligning them with the AAUW California model. This will make it much easier for the branch to update its bylaws as it usually must do every two years when National requests changes. At the same time, the Policies and Procedures are being reviewed for duplications therein. The result will be a more coherent set of rules for our branch that can be more easily updated as necessary.

Mary Lamo and Valerie Little, Program Co-VPs, in addition to providing an amazing line-up of mission-focused speakers, have created a 10-question Survey about our branch meetings. Your prompt and thoughtful response this month will enable next year's Program VP(s) to develop the programs that most meet the needs of our members. So that we can actually visualize who is doing what, Mary Lamo has created a PowerPoint organizational chart for our branch and its multitude of committees. Plus, she created an Excel spreadsheet specifying each branch meeting's financials and attendance so that we can accurately assess outcomes.

Raquel Sanchez and Cacilia Kim, AAUW Fund Co-VPs, very ably took on the re-imagining and reorganization of the AAUW Fund, this year educating our members about how the different funds provide for the many programs of AAUW.

Deloris Mayuga, Investment VP, has ensured the ability to pay our facility costs in this low-interest market, by moving funds from an Endowment CD into a second Building CD and then simplifying the process by combining the subsequent two Building CDs into one. She and Linda Patten, Treasurer, are investigating the feasibility of using an online bank for the late January rollover of this now larger CD. Plus Deloris is the liaison with the Trustee of the Frances Magarian Trust, from which the branch will be receiving funds, and it's her role to bring together options for use and investment of this generous bequest.

Linda Patten, with help from Pat Ferrer, Webmaster, will be adding Paypal to pay for branch meetings. We realize that for our younger members, writing a check each month is old-school and this will allow for payment up to the deadline. The goal is a button to be available on our website to pay for attendance at the March branch meeting and beyond. The user will pay approximately \$1 extra for the privilege.

Our branch's operational costs are covered by the branch portion of memberships (\$26 regular/\$13 grad student). Our budget this year was based on 132 members. Alex Bellenger and Mina Naghavi, Membership Co-VPs, along with their team, and our members' efforts, have already exceeded that number by 3 members. We expect to hear from LBCC very shortly that they have become a College/University partner, which will increase awareness about AAUW and will eventually lead to more members. Plus the local Younger Women's Task Force, initiated by Leah, Alex, and Mina, will bring in members who wish to be more involved; as will the new LinkedIn site they established for AAUW Long Beach.

Jeane Caveness, Co-Secretary, has been flexible about handling a truly unusual arrangement. She agreed to be the scribe for the branch meetings, to maintain the records required by our incorporated status and is the signature as Secretary on our documents. She has been supported by a wonderful group of our members acting as Secretaries Pro-Tem at the board meetings who pass along the necessary documents to her. All have been following a new Minutes format that enables easier review.

In deference to the Nominations Committee, the message this month focused on the elected officers' unique contributions this year, but there are many appointed officers and administrative chairs who are also contributing greatly to the welfare of this branch. Many thanks to all our involved members!

If you, dear member, are approached by the Nominations Committee, please consider volunteering with Sharon and Cacilia next year and continuing the momentum started by this year's very active officers. It's an amazing personal growth opportunity.

Looking forward to seeing you at the February 6th branch meeting, in an interest group this coming month or volunteering at the STEM Career Conference on February 26!
