



HOW DOES THE (unrestricted) AAUW FUND WORK???₅

The majority of AAUW's 1,000 separate fund codes identify our named, restricted funds, collectively called the AAUW endowment, which provide the support for AAUW's fellowships and grants. A few other fund codes denote smaller pools of restricted funds, spendable solely for specific programs, such as the Legal Advocacy Fund and research. Every other program receives full or partial funding from the AAUW Fund, which derives primarily from unrestricted contributions, with a small amount coming from dues and sponsorships. Unrestricted gifts make it possible for AAUW to respond quickly to new or unforeseen challenges facing women and girls, leverage and innovate mission-based opportunities, and attract new audiences by enabling us to expand our programs.

Long Beach Work Smart Pilot

The Work Smart Pilot program is proceeding full speed ahead due to the outstanding efforts of our planning committee. We've discovered that this grassroots program implementation is just as new to AAUW as it is to our Long Beach branch. There has been a great deal of collaboration with National on marketing materials and program organization.

On September 17, Jesse Rauch, AAUW Senior Program Manager for Work Smart and Start Smart, visited Long Beach to hold a morning planning session with 11 of our AAUW LB Work Smart committee members, followed by a training for facilitators that afternoon. 20 women have been certified as facilitators.

Three pilot workshops have been scheduled, being held at three different times of the



day, for various audiences. The final one, Saturday,

November 12, 10am – 12:30pm, is open to the public at
the Third District Field Office, thanks to Third District
Councilwoman Suzie Price. Registration is online at
http://www.aauw.org/work-smart-california/. We have
already met with three city councilpersons (Al Austin, Lena Gonzalez and Suzie Price), Mayor Garcia, and the Sen-

ior Field Representative of Congressman Lowenthal, successfully eliciting various levels of support. More meetings with well-connected LB organizations are being planned. In addition, the CSULB Student Government Chief of Staff attended the facilitators' training to determine if Start Smart should be implemented on the CSULB campus.
