Our January meeting will offer a chance to learn about Women in the Military. Of the 1% of the United States population that serves in the military, 15% are women. AAUW Member Daphne Ching Jackson will moderate a panel of three women, Wilma Powell, Neya Gilliam, and Wendy Lewis, who will field questions about women's experiences as members of the military.

Wilma Powell received her degree in Management from the University of Redlands. She worked for the Long Beach port for 30 years and served as the Director of Trade & Maritime Services. She served as chair of the Defense Advisory Committee on Women in the Services and also as a board member of the Long Beach Chamber Women's Council. Powell also has received several awards and accolades including: Secretary of Defense Award for Outstanding Public Services (1994), U.S Coast Guard Distinguished Service Medal (1995), and Outstanding Women of the Year: American Business Women's Association (1994).

Neya Gilliam joined the Department of Veterans Affairs as a Program Support Clerk for the



Department of Veterans Affairs as a Program Support Clerk for the Department of Medicine at the Greater Los Angeles Healthcare System. In this role, Gilliam oversaw the day-to-day administrative activities for the Rheumatology Department.

Prior to joining Veteran Affairs, Gilliam served more than five years on active duty in the United States Air Force as a Personnel Apprentice. She had the pleasure of being stationed in Okinawa, Japan and Lajos Fields Azores, Portugal. After separating, she completed an Associate degree in both patisserie-baking & culinary arts at Le Cordon Bleu in Pasadena, CA.

Wendy Lewis served in the United States Navy for eight years

and as a Staff Financial Manager under the United States Third Fleet Commander. Following her separation from the Navy, Wendy received her Bachelors degree in Nutritional Science from California State University Long Beach. While attending CSULB, she served as the student government Secretary of Veterans Affairs and was elected Treasurer during her final year. She also was Vice President of the Student Veterans of America chapter at CSULB and a member of two honors societies.

We look forward to seeing you at the AAUW meeting on Saturday, January 7, 2017 to learn about these incredible women's stories and experiences as members of the military and as veterans.

Regular board business was conducted at the November Executive Committee meeting. The following motions were passed:

- Deloris Mayuga moved that the following motion be substituted for the motion creating a reserve account that passed on October 17. The Policy and Procedures of AAUW-Long Beach Branch be amended as follows:

Policies and Procedures, Section 5. Budget

c. There shall be a Reserve Fund. The monies in the Reserve Fund may be used for branch activities, projects, and operations with Board approval. Motion was seconded by Sharon Westafer.

- Deloris Mayuga moved that the Executive Committee recommend to the Branch that Standing Rules of AAUW-Long Beach Branch, Section 2, a. be amended as follows: Standing Rules, Section 2. Budget

Balances which exist in the general fund accounts at the end of the fiscal year shall be divided between the Convention Fund and Reserve Fund, with a minimum of \$500 transferred to the Convention Fund and the balanced transferred to the Reserve Fund.

Motion was seconded by Lois Ledger.

- Deloris Mayuga moved that \$2,000 be moved from the Convention Fund to the Reserve Fund.
