The March 9, 2017 Branch dinner meeting features Dr. Virginia "Ginny" Baxter, one of Long Beach's foremost community leaders, who was honored in 2011 as the Press-Telegram "Amazing Woman in Education". She will share her insights and presentation on **First Ladies in American History**. Adding to her many accolades, in 2014 Ginny was elected as a Trustee on the Long Beach Community College District Board and last year, was elected President of



the Board. Ginny is now retired from her position as the Executive Director of the Long Beach City College Foundation, a position she held for 32 years. Her many years raising funds for Long Beach City College gave her special insights into their needs and how LBCC supports students.

Ginny earned her B.A. in History from Occidental College, and her M.A. in History from Occidental. In 1988 she received her Ed.D. in Educational Management from the University of LaVerne. Her dissertation was on "Role of Leadership in the Development of Successful Community College Foundations". She went on to distinguish herself as a community college foundation leader who raised millions for the college.

She has been a 30+ year member of AAUW and plays a big part by helping our branch make location arrangements for the annual AAUW STEM conference held at LBCC.

Her accomplishments have brought her distinguished honors from community organizations including the California Conference for Equality and Justice (CCEJ), New Hope Grief Support, and Long Beach Soroptimist "Woman of the Year (2004). Ginny has served as a leader of many organizations in Long Beach, but she may be best known as the person who has led many educational tours to Washington, D.C., South America, Europe and Cuba for more than 32 years! This meeting also honors the Past Presidents of AAUW-Long Beach Branch making this an exceptional meeting that focuses on accomplished women and not one to miss! Join us for this special evening!

President's Message



"There are only two times. Now and too late." Anh Do

The first two weeks of the Trump presidency have been tumultuous. Widespread dissension and civil protests, including several million women around the world who marched for women's equality and safety, have already marked President Trump's fledgling presidency. Turmoil further ensued on January 27th when President Trump issued an executive order that (among other actions) bans citizens of seven Muslim-majority countries from entering the United States for the next 90 days and suspends the admission of all refugees for 120 days. A federal judge in New York (and later in other cities) issued a temporary stay on parts of this executive order and legal scholars across the country have decried President Trump's actions as a violation of numerous protections in our Constitution, including due process, equal protection and freedom of religion.

Whether we support all, some, or none of President's Trump's actions, the sharp divisions in our country require every single one of us to take some form of action -- now. Significant policy decisions and actions have already been made and many more are on the way, including filling key cabinet positions with individuals that could jeopardize the health and safety of women and girls as well as their educational and employment opportunities. We can agree to disagree but before we can do that, we need to be fully informed about the impact of these decisions. And where strong disagreements still exist, we need to speak out and work together to find common ground and solutions that bring this country together, not further apart.



There is much work to do. And AAUW is well poised to do it. Our national website provides a wealth of information on key issues that impact women and girls – including current cabinet nominations – and provides specific actions each of us can take.

On a lighter note, as we celebrate Women's History Month in March, we hope you will attend the meeting on March 9th when we will recognize past presidents of our Branch. This dinner meeting is another example of our program planners' attempts to provide a variety of meeting locations and meals.

Long Beach Branch Fellowship and **Grant Recipients**

Anne Ingalls Fund Co-VP



Each year the endowments established by California Branches in honor of state presidents, branches or branch members honored by their branches, fund women with very worthwhile projects. Only the interest earned from the endowments is used to fund Fellowships and Grants so the endowments will last in perpetuity.

International Fellowships are awarded for full-time graduate or postgraduate study or research to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents. The recipient of the Anna Stofflet Townsend International Endowment interest for 2016-2017 is **VIOLET NDEDA**, who will tackle the decline in fish stocks and extinction of major commercial fisheries in Africa, focusing on Kenya. Her goal is to contribute to the taxonomy and identification of fish species utilizing molecular tools, ultimately understanding and preserving the genetic diversity of fish species in that region. She is working on an M.S. in Wildlife and Fisheries Sciences at Texas A&M University in College Station, Texas.

Supplemental grants support community-based projects in the recipient's home country. The Long Beach branch established the Anna Stofflet Townsend International Endowment in 1953 and it was completed in 1968. Anna was California State Division President from 1950 to 1952 and Association VP, South Pacific Region from 1955 to 1963.

American Fellowships support women doctoral candidates completing dissertations and scholars seeking funds for postdoctoral research leave or for preparing completed research for publication. Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents. The Long Beach branch established and completed the Louise Ruth Arbogast American Fellowship Endowment in 1986. The recipient of the Louise Ruth Arbogast American Fellowship Endowment interest for 2016-2017 is FELICITY MUTH, who seeks to explain how bumblebees adapt to multiple nutritionally diverse rewards, i.e., products from flowers. Her research will aid in understanding bees ability to learn and remember floral rewards. Muth, who works as a popular science writer for Scientific American, is a postdoctoral researcher at University of Nevada, Reno specializing in biology and animal behavior.

Healthcare - a woman's issue. Healthcare crosses all lines - gender, age, income, race. Everyone is involved. It is an issue on which we can join together with others. It is an AAUW issue. Women are the biggest losers if ACA, Medi-Cal, and Medicare get cut or reduced. Did you know? The Affordable Care Act (ACA) provides: healthcare for people with pre-existing conditions, no lifetime limit on benefits, coverage for basic preventative care that cannot be charged to the patients such as mammograms, pap smears, immunizations, birth control and screening for a number of childhood and adult diseases? Are you aware that ACA allows young people to stay on their parents' coverage until age 26; it expands Medi-Cal coverage for children and the low income which is especially important for young women of reproductive age, and for women from age 50-64 without good jobs that provide coverage. Medicare is for all people over 65-many do not get there. So let's talk about healthcare as an AAUW public policy issue. What can we do to inform ourselves and others and to keep healthcare for all?

Let's stop the push by the current Congress to repeal "Obamacare" which is really the **Affordable Care Act.** Let's protect healthcare for all. Let's join other developed countries in improving health care for all. See you Thursday night!



The regular meeting of the full board took place on Monday, January 16, 2017 at the Unitarian Universalist Church of Long Beach. Regular business was transacted.

The following motion was passed:

"By direction of the Executive Committee Deloris Mayuga moved that the Standing Rules of AAUW – Long Beach Branch, Section 2, a. Budget be amended as follows: a. Balances which exist in the general fund accounts at the end of the fiscal year shall be divided between the Convention Fund and Reserve Fund, with a minimum of \$500 transferred to the Convention Fund and the balance transferred to the Reserve Fund."
