AAUW Work Smart

Lots of great news! AAUW Work Smart has a new website and a new logo. CSULB has contracted with AAUW for three years to provide AAUW Start Smart workshops (for college students) – their



first is April 27. The last week of March, AAUW received a \$100,000 grant from LUNA, partnering with Leanin.Org, to hold 100 AAUW Work Smart workshops across the country in 2017.

Four of the LUNA workshops must be in Los Angeles and by convincing them that Long Beach is in the LA area, we were

able to provide two workshops to local nonprofits with whom we had made contact during our pilot program. The LGBTQ Center Long Beach will hold a workshop on July 11, open to the public, and the VA Long Beach Healthcare System will hold one on August 9, open to women veterans. In addition, we were able to help out the Anderson Women, MBA alumni of UCLA's Anderson School of Management, to schedule a workshop for October 7.

We will give you details next month about the success of the April 5 AAUW Work Smart workshop, sponsored by County of Los Angeles Supervisor Janice Hahn and held at the Port of Long Beach. As of April 4, 44 had registered. District 3 City Councilwoman, Suzie Price, is sponsoring our second 2017 workshop on Saturday morning, May 20. We met with the staff of District 2 City Councilwoman Jeannine Pearce and they will be sponsoring a Saturday morning workshop in June at the Bixby Park Community Center. On April 18, we will meet with District 9 Councilman and Vice-Mayor Rex Richardson.

Information and registration is online at salary.aauw.org/longbeach with workshops limited to 40 attendees. You've been doing a great job of spreading the word to any woman you know who could benefit – please keep up the momentum.

As the workshops grow in number and we help more women, we will need more of your assistance to keep moving forward. Public Policy- AAUW and ACA

"Obamacare," for some, is a fighting word. However, mention the "Affordable Care Act" (ACA), and the reaction from the very same people is notably different. That's because they like the fact that the ACA does a lot of good for many. Women were particularly big winners under the Affordable Care Act, which is the most significant expansion of health insurance coverage since the creation of Medicare and Medicaid in the 1960s

Under the ACA, health insurance companies in the individual market no longer can charge women more than men, and they now must cover services that are unique to women, like prenatal care and childbirth. Other services for women also must now be covered free of charge, including screenings for breast and cervical cancer, pap smears and mammograms. ACA also prevents insurance companies from refusing to cover an individual because of a pre-existing health condition.

Women were not the only winners. Aspects of the ACA directly benefited children and young adults, like the provision allowing those under age 26 to remain on their parents' policies. It helped Americans with chronic conditions by removing "lifetime" limits on health care expenditures.

The Congressional Budget Office estimates that the recently unveiled plan to repeal and replace "Obamacare" will result in 14 million fewer Americans having health insurance after the first year, and 24 million after 10 years have passed. Although the proposed replacement would have reduced the federal deficit, it did so on the backs of middle class, poorer and older Americans. *All of us must stay informed and understand how proposed changes will impact not only our health but also those in our communities*.

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AAUW Long Beach Branch Endowment Interest Recipients

Anne Ingalls, Co-Fund V.P.

Research and Projects Grants include Career Development Grants, which help women who seek to achieve upward mobility within their present careers or are trying to change careers, and Community Action Grants. The Long Beach branch has four completed Research and Projects. Grants that honor three members: Joyce E. Clark, completed in 1990, Connie Wright Inskeep, completed in 1995, and Ethel Black, completed in 2001. The fourth Research and Projects Grant honors the Long Beach branch and was completed in 2008. The recipients of interest money from these endowments are featured here:



Pursuing her master's in public health with a certificate in humanitarian assistance, **ELIZABETH DANKENBRING** works in maternal and child health research. With her **Career Development Grant**, she will focus on displaced populations, specializing in prenatal and postnatal nutrition, infant brain development and family planning during traumatic events. When she receives her master's, she hopes to make motherhood a safer choice, even in unsafe territories. Elizabeth receives interest money from the Joyce Clark endowment and studies at Columbia University in New York, New York.

JESSICA SUPINSKI, awarded a **Career Development Grant**, is designing co-curricular instruction to help career training for adults who, after overcoming poverty and systematic marginalization, now wish to retool. Her design will develop management and interpersonal skills for these adults during their preparation for employment. She received her M.S. in Instructional Design from Western Governors University, Seattle, Washington and developed the Women in Trades and Technology Leadership Empowerment Seminar designed for women in nontraditional fields. Jessica studies under the Connie Wright Inskeep endowment.

<u>AUDREY SALGADO</u>, Project Director for the Girls STEAM Project, was awarded a **Community Action Grant** to help 200 girls in seventh and eighth grades to expand their horizons in STEM and art. Collaborating with the Corner Museum and Arts Center and Central Alabama Community College, the AAUW Birmingham Branch will develop a replicable model that changes stereotypes around women in STEAM, empowering participants, parents and community volunteers. This project is a two-year program in Sylacauga, Alabama and is funded by interest from the Long Beach/Ethel Black endowment.

The **YWCA Pasadena-Foothill Valley**, under the direction of <u>JESSICA KUBEL</u>, is funded by interest from the Long Beach branch endowment. The project, TechGyrls, is a highly successful nationwide YWCA education program that exposes girls to new, relevant technology and inspires them to pursue STEM-related course work and careers. TechGyrls aims to grow underserved girls' interest in and knowledge of STEM fields and to encourage them to pursue STEM studies and careers in the future.

Awarded an **International Fellowship**, <u>VIOLET NDEDA</u> will tackle the decline in fish stocks and extinction of major commercial fisheries in Africa, focusing on Kenya. Her goal is to contribute to the taxonomy and identification of fish species utilizing molecular tools, ultimately understanding and preserving the genetic diversity of fish species in that region. She received her M.S. in Wildlife and fisheries sciences from Texas A&M University. Violet studies under the Anna Stofflet Townsend endowment. International Fellowships are awarded to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents but are studying at colleges or universities in the U.S.

Awarded an **American Fellowship**, <u>FELICITY MUTH</u>, seeks to explain how bumblebees adapt to multiple nutritionally diverse rewards, i.e., products from flowers. Her research will aid in understanding bees ability to learn and remember floral rewards. Muth, who works as a popular science writer for Scientific American, is a postdoctural researcher at University of Nevada, Reno. She is funded by interest from the Louise Arbogast endowment. American Fellowships are awarded to U.S. citizens or permanent residents who are completing their doctoral thesis, preparing it for publication or doing post-doctoral research.

Dear AAUW branch members,

The AAUW Board of Directors will now vote on the proposed dues increase at their regularly scheduled meeting on June 13, 2017. ~ ~ 50 Year Honorary Lifetime Membership Awarded to Four Long Beach Branch Members! ~ ~

Recent Honorees, Elsa-Karen Braden (EB), Fay Denny (FD), Beverly O'Neill (BO) and Mary Sipple (MS) (celebrating at the June 2017 branch meeting) were asked to respond to the following questions:

What brought you to AAUW? EB – "Upon graduating from UCSB in Home Economics in 1962, my first job landed me in Pomona Valley, where the local branch contacted me. The President, Effie Sparling, became my mentor. I became President and attended 2 wonderful national conventions where I was fascinated with the power of parliamentary procedure. In addition, I am passionate about the Fellowship program which supports graduate education for women. Later, the Edison Company transferred me to Long Beach where I immediately joined the Long Beach Branch when the ERA became our major focus. I was President when we opened membership to men and helped the city sponsor an International Women's Conference. We published our first cookbook to support fellowships. I served on the state board when the Legal Advocacy Foundation was created, and was a part of the initial leadership training program created by Sharon Shuster and Mooneen Leece. According to our Yearbook, I am the first President to be listed by my name rather than my husband's.

FD – "My good friend Sharon Clunk introduced me to AAUW Long Beach in 1967. At that time we had a "Recent Grads" section (15 years from high school graduation) which all of us "youngsters" participated in. I made many good friends and had lots of fun. In addition, I attended Branch meetings and met many wonderful women." BO – "I knew about AAUW while I was at CSULB. I loved the name and what it stood for. The members were people I wanted to be around."

MS – "I moved to the Bay Area and met a mother of my daughter's friends. The mother's name was Jean, was a good member of AAUW, and got me to join as well. My family moved to Long Beach, so I transferred my membership to this branch."

Why have you maintained your 50 year presence in AAUW? EB – "I can hardly wait to get back on the campaign trail to finalize the adoption of the ERA. (During these 50 years my mother returned to CSUF to obtain her degree and join AAUW in Whittier under Jeanette Miller. She was active in the Richmond-El Cerrito Branch and became President of the Irvine Branch. So you see AAUW is in my blood.) My biggest reward in life is all my AAUW supporters like you."

FD – "I have stayed in AAUW because of the Public Policy positions and the Educational Opportunity Fund of the organization. Due to my participation in many officer positions, attendance at conferences and branch meetings, my leadership skills have been developed. My education has consistently grown as there is always something new to learn about; but the best part has been the many friendships I've shared with empowered women through the years."

BO – "Although I wasn't as active while during my working years and when I became a politician, I have always believed in the goals and purpose of the organization."

MS – "My mom was born in 1883, when very few women went to college, but she attended Brown Institute and Columbia University. She brought me up to be a gung-ho woman. My father died when I was 12, leaving my mom a single parent with 4 children. She got a job teaching Home-Ec. Mom's family was 3,000 miles away."

On behalf of the branch, we are grateful for the 5 decades of service and dedication these individuals have contributed to the mission of AAUW. Our most sincere congratulations to all four of you!
