Food Insecurity and Displaced Students

Housing and food insecurity are growing problems on college campuses. The rising cost of tuition and the increasing number of nontraditional students mean that more students are living on a shoestring budget. Today, one in 10 California State University students are homeless or displaced and one in 5 are experiencing food insecurity. California Community College students are faced with the same struggles, with one in 5 students experiencing

homelessness or housing instability and two-thirds with food insecurity.² Food and housing instability are more prevalent among students of color and first-generation students.³ Both Long Beach State University and Long Beach Community College have been champions for their students by establishing programs to help support and address these issues.

Our September program features speakers from both campuses; CSULB Assistant Dean of Students Carol Menard, who coordinates the Student Emergency Intervention and Wellness Program serving the most at-risk students through emergency grants, hotel vouchers or short-term housing, meal assistance, counseling, and on-campus employment. In addition, LBCC District Trustee Dr. Virginia "Ginny" Baxter who with Trus-



tee Sunny Zia helped launch a task force to drive donations to the Long Beach City College Foundation. They helped to support students in need of tuition, but also food, basic necessities, and housing. We hope that you will join us for this presentation on a topic that is not only making national headlines, but is affecting our local community. All are invited to also meet our Frances Magarian Scholarship recipients at this first meeting of the AAUW year!

Did You Know? by Daphne Ching-Jackson, Investments Vice-President

Occasionally we receive questions about the Branch financial policies and procedures. In June a member asked why the principal is not used for projects. Policies and Procedures, Section 8e specifies that the principal may be used, by a 2/3 Branch vote. However, it has been conventional practice to not use the principal and to use the interest earned from the principal for mission-based projects. As cited in this issue of the Vantage, the Board voted to use the interest money from the Endowment Fund next year for purchase of new AV equipment for the branch and for Facebook advertising to promote the Branch's mission-based activities.

Each year as a Branch member you have the right to make suggestions to the Budget Committee on how the Endowment Fund interest is used but the use of the funds must be for mission-based activities. The Budget Committee Chair solicits suggestions through published Vantage articles in the Spring. The Budget Committee meets in April to develop a new operating budget and to consider suggestions for using the Endowment Fund interest.

We plan to have more articles to help all of our Branch members get a glimpse of the financial picture for the Branch and how financial decisions are made. If you wish to read the Branch Policy and Procedures regarding finances, you can find that information in the 2016-2017 Branch Directory booklet.

Regular business was conducted at the July, 2017 Board of Directors Meeting and Retreat. The following motions were passed:

Motion by Pat Ferrer that the Board of Directors approves fundraising activities for Tech Trek (January 2018) and the AAUW Fund (date TBD but not January 2018). Darlene Daclan seconded the motion.

Motion by Frances Rozner that, by direction of the WorkSmart Committee, approximately \$1,030 of the Endowment Fund interest be applied toward the purchase of a new laptop, a projector, and Microsoft Office Software to be used by the Branch for meetings/events and for *AAUW WorkSmart in Long Beach* workshops.

Motion by Daphne Ching-Jackson that the Branch allocates \$150 from the Outreach Fund for Facebook advertising to support mission-based activities. It was seconded by Ginny Baxter.

Motion by Frances Rozner that, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, all 2015 Bylaws that were excised during the updating of the Bylaws in 2016 and 2017 are deemed worthy of transfer, be approved with the submitted wording and transferred to the specified Policies and Procedures and Standing Rules as proposed in the attached spreadsheet labeled *Carryover from 2015 Bylaws* [17 items to policies and Procedures and 3 items to Standing Rules].

Motion by Frances Rozner that, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, the removal, reorganization and updating of existing Policies and Procedures and the addition of new Policies and Procedures be approved as proposed in the attached spreadsheet labeled *Proposed Policies and Procedures*.

Motion by Frances Rozner that, by direction of the Bylaws Committee, the renumbering of the existing Policies and Procedures be approved as proposed in the attached spreadsheet labeled *Renumbering of Policies and Procedures*. This was due to the transference of older bylaws requiring insertion, the addition of new sections, and the reorganization of older sections.

National Convention Recap June 14-17 2017 Washington D.C.

The speaker at the opening dinner, Judy Woodruff, Co-Anchor, PBS Newshour, was excellent. The Plenary session featured Linda DiVall, a researcher on behalf of Republicans, and Celinda Lake, a researcher on behalf of the Democrats. They were fair and informative with their views on the current political climate.

Tererai Trent, Ph.D., winner of the 2017 AAUW Alumnae Recognition Award spoke at the Gala dinner. She was sincere in her appreciation of the award and captivated the audience. The superstar of the convention was Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor, the featured speaker at the Gala dinner. She circulated throughout the room, with her Secret Service agents, while simultaneously shaking hands, hugging some attendees and answering questions from Kimberly Churches, AAUW CEO. Ms. Sotomayor was charming, warm and extremely articulate and didn't miss a beat as she shook hands with at least three fourths of those present.

The final speaker, at the closing plenary was Laura Dunn, J.D., Executive Director of SurvJustice Inc., a nonprofit based in Washington, D.C. which focuses on victims of sexual violence. Bios on the convention speakers can be found on the National website.

It was determined by the AAUW Board that the next National Convention will be held in 2020 to coincide with the 100th birthday of women receiving the right to vote. Conventions over the past 3 or 4 years have lost money and the 2017 Convention is projected to lose over \$1,000,000. AAUW will focus on four priorities this year: College and University Partners, Pay Equity, STEM and Public Policy research.

Lobby Day was energizing and informational. All participants from California met with representatives of Senators Diane Feinstein and Kamala Harris, and then broke up into groups to meet with their individual representatives or staff. The Long Beach group, Sharon Westafer, Cacilia Kim, Alex Bellenger and Frances Rozner, met with Congressman Alan Lowenthall's staff and he dropped in to greet us before going to a meeting. His voting record is 100% for AAUW issues, which we knew before the meeting; however it was nice to meet his staffers, both of whom are from Long Beach and attended Poly High School.

The Frances Magarian Scholarships

The AAUW Long Beach Frances Magarian Scholarship Fund was established in 2013 from monies bequeathed to the branch from Frances Magarian, a long time branch member. A committee was formed to establish criteria for applicants, guidelines for the committee and for the selection process.



Two scholarships of \$2500 each are awarded to two recipients at

CSULB and two scholarships of \$500 each are awarded to two students at LBCC. Each student must meet the criteria established in the application, complete an application form, and then meet with the scholarship committee to be interviewed. Applicants are notified of the results of the application process soon after the interviews. The winners understand that they will be invited to a branch meeting to meet members.

The scholarships promote AAUW's mission of advancing equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, philanthropy and research and they meet the branch Strategic Plan objectives and goals by increasing equity for women and girls in our local community and increasing collaboration in the community, promoting community outreach and increasing membership. As evidenced by AAUW's latest report regarding student debt, most college students can use as much help as possible. The committee believes that while the scholarships amounts aren't large, they do help the recipients pay for some costs of their education.

What are some past recipients doing? In 2016, Rachel Thompson received a CSULB scholarship and graduated with a BS in Kinesiology Exercise Science. She was a member of the University Honors program and her undergraduate thesis examined the progression of Phase III cardiac Rehab patients. Rachel attended Tech Trek camp when she was in middle school.

Mina Vareth graduated from CSULB with a BS in Finance in 2015, and studied International Management as part of the exchange program at the Hamburg University of Applied Sciences.

Nina Aviles graduated from LBCC in 2015 with an Associate of Science Degree in Biology/Biological Sciences and is currently pursuing a BA Degree in Biomedical Sciences at Marymount California University.

This is formal notice that the following amendment, stated in italics below, to Standing Rule 5a. Membership, will be voted upon by the branch membership at the September 9, 2017 business meeting:
