Women's Health Issues As We Age

Healthcare matters, and for women, certain health issues specific to women, such as pelvic floor conditions, i.e. pelvic pain, pelvic organ prolapse, pain with sex, incontinence, as well as pre and post-menopausal and pre and post-partum symptoms, are often overlooked or misdiagnosed by doctors. Why? And what can be done about this?

Women of any age and in any stage of life can be affected by pelvic floor muscle (PFM) dysfunction. One study found that the prevalence of pelvic floor disorders increased with age, and "40 percent of women aged 60-79, and 53% of women 80+ suffered from at least one symptomatic disorder". ² Many women suffer in silence, or become frustrated by a lack of answers and help in



the medical community. However, there is hope. Physical Therapy for Pelvic Floor Dysfunction is helping women heal from life altering conditions. ³

February's Branch meeting Program will discuss many of the pelvic floor conditions and shed light on physical therapy treatments. The program will also include the most up-to-date information on the state of women's healthcare policies in light of changes to Obamacare, and how you can advocate for your

AAUW Work Smart Project Update

Our grassroots AAUW Work Smart program is moving ahead with generous sponsorships from LUNA®, City Councilwomen Suzie Price and Jeannine Pearce, and LA County Supervisor Janice Hahn; plus with supportive hosts Junior League of Long Beach, LBCC



Feminist Club, Councilwoman Stacy Mungo, and The LGBTQ Center. We held **eight workshops in 2017**, with the final workshop at the El Dorado Senior Center, at which we had 28 registered with 12 actual attendees. We finished the year with 159 women and 4 men having learned how to effectively negotiate their pay and benefits.



AAUW has provided us with two more LUNA sponsorships to be used by March 31, so we are actively seeking locations for February and March workshops. The Port of Long Beach has graciously volunteered their training room for LA County Supervisor Janice Hahn's 2018 sponsored workshop to be held on Equal Pay Day, Tuesday, April 10. The workshop sponsored by Lynn Shrum will be held in May. We are also in the process of submitting a grant request for workshop support to Wells Fargo under their workplace development category.

AAUW Long Beach is currently the only branch in Southern California offering AAUW Work Smart. Just recently, AAUW, Friends of the Commission on the Status of

Women, and the San Francisco Department on the Status of Women have launched a large-scale, grassroots initiative to train 20,000 women by 2020. They are starting their ambitious effort with 3 LUNA-sponsored workshops.

Based on what we are learning, most of those who attend the workshops come through personal contacts. Please keep promoting our branch's AAUW Work Smart in Long Beach workshops to the women you know in all your circles of influence – one-on-one and through social media. As the calendar develops, please continue to send prospect names to salary.aauw.org/longbeach.

Looking forward in 2018 to building the momentum to actively close the gender wage gap in Long Beach – with everyone's help!

Use of Endowment Fund Interest

All AAUW Branch members have the opportunity to suggest how to use the interest proceeds from the Endowment Fund held in a Certificate of Deposit. The Endowment Fund consists of a principal amount of \$33,000 and is currently held at Banc of California. A small bank, but it allows our Endowment Fund to earn at a rate of 1.29%, which is higher than other area banks. Some banks in our community have offered a rate that is less than 1%.

The fund was started many years ago by AAUW members who left a part of their estate to Long Beach Branch upon their passing. The fund is comprised of 3 such contributions from our late friends Ethel Black, \$25,000; Irene Holmes, \$3,000 and Neva Blust, \$5,000. The interest earned can be designated to a mission based Branch activity. Please give some thought to which activity you want to designate. The STEM Career Conference gives members the opportunity see 250 STEM oriented 7th & 8th girls, from 7 different schools, who will become inspired by women STEM professionals on a college campus discussing their careers and giving the girls a hands-on activity to learn about that career.

Once we complete our 15th STEM Career Conference, we will have given 2000+ girls the opportunity to learn through hands-on workshops about exciting STEM careers. They learn STEM careers are attainable, with dedication to a goal. This year the 10 workshops include: architect, astrophysicist, aerospace engineer, civil & environmental engineer, dietitian, speech-language pathologist, paleontologist, environmental scientist, mechanical engineer, and human factors researcher. The Conference is scheduled for **Friday, February 23, 2018** from 4:30pm - 7:00pm. (volunteers arrive earlier!) at Long Beach City College (Liberal Arts Campus). Dr. Lindsey Liggan, PT, DPT, WCS, PRPC

Lindsey earned her Doctorate of Physical Therapy degree from Western University of Health Sciences after graduating from CSULB with her BS in Kinesiology with an emphasis in Exercise Science. Following her graduation from Physical Therapy school Lindsey has focused on pelvic floor treatment for both women and men. Lindsey has undergone training in manual therapy, pelvic floor rehabilitation, orthopedics, pain modulation, and visceral mobilization. She earned her Pelvic Rehabilitation Practitioner Certification (PRPC) from the Herman and Wallace Pelvic Rehabilitation Institute in 2016. She also went on to become one of just 400 physical therapists certified by the American Board of Physical Therapy Specialties as a Women's Health Specialist (WCS) in 2017.

Lindsey is currently serving as an Instructor and Clinical Faculty for the Department of Physical Therapy at Western University of Health Sciences in Pomona. Her areas of teaching include anatomy, physiology, and medical screening. She is committed to continual growth as an educator and a clinician, while promoting the advancement of the profession and cultivating the future generation of physical therapists.

Gerrie Schipske

Gerrie Schipske is certified both as a nurse and an attorney. She is a CSULB adjunct faculty member, author, former board member to LB Community College. Gerrie was a former City Councilwoman and is now running for the 34th State Senate District. She is married to her longtime partner Flo Pickett.

Gerrie has taught at CSULB off and on since 1978 – in public policy and administration, political science, women's studies and for the past three years at both Health Care Administration and the Senior University. She was honored at President Barack Obama's White House in 2013 as one of seven Champions of Change for Open Government.

Gerrie founded several local nonprofit organizations to help the community including, The Long Beach Rosie the Riveter Foundation, which raised funds for the design and development of the Long Beach Rosie the Riveter Park and Interpretive Center located at Clark and Conant in East Long Beach. This three acre park is the only site in the US to honor the women who worked in the aircraft industry and the Women Airforce Service Pilots (WASP).

Her book, "Rosie the Riveter in Long Beach" takes a look at the unprecedented number of women who took jobs at aircraft plants, shipyards, munitions factories and other concerns across the US during WWII. Affectionately and collectively called "Rosie the Riveter" after a popular 1943 song, thousands of these women came to the US Army financed Douglas Aircraft in Long Beach to produce an astonishing number of the aircraft used for the war.
