MeToo Hits Middle Schools from C.S. Monitor Feb 5, 2018

American Association of University Women reported in 2011. K-12 students filed at least 17,000 official reports of sexual assault by their peers between 2011 and 2015. Also 56% of girls and 40% of boys in grades 7-12 in a national survey reported that they had experienced sexual harassment. "This problem is very prevalent in K-12 schools; it is just something that a lot of people are either not aware of or are reluctant to admit," says Sabrina Stevens., a senior manager at NWLC*, which is partnering with SSAIS* on the #MeToo K-12 campaign.

Why It Matters...Sexual misconduct can deprive students of their equal right to an education. Research has found that this affects thousands each year, including those as young as 5 or 6 year old. "Under Title IX, schools are supposed to promptly investigate and address reports of sexual harassment and assault and work to prevent a hostile environment. Among K-12 schools Title IX is perhaps the least enforced of the education laws," says Bill Howe who oversaw Connecticut's Title IX compliance until 2015 and is currently an educational Consultant in Hartford, Conn.

Some of the systemic problems in enforcement are:

- An attitude that since Title IX doesn't come with its own extra federal funding, it's a low priority to enforce it.
- A lack of training and a practice of having people who are Title IX coordinators "in name only".
- Title IX coordinators who are also attorneys for school boards or hold other roles that create a
 conflict of interest, because they have incentive to protect the reputation of the district.

Most schools already have a lot of demands to meet tight budgets. Most administrators and faculty want to do the right thing. The #MeToo K-12 Campaign acknowledges that and is promoting resources including tool kits and a video made with students and experts, to help inform schools, parents and the public about harassment. The public must raise the issue at meetings of the school board and PTAs. Inform in the media and insist on enforcement. The children are waiting.
