Do You Want to Get a Better Understanding of the Ballot Measures Before You Vote in November?



Our October guest speaker, Nancy Mahr, is well-qualified to share with the branch her knowledge of the 11 propositions on the upcoming ballot. Nancy is member of the AAUW Palos Verdes Peninsula Branch and is a California AAUW Director and Public Policy Co-Chair.

You may have received emails containing Nancy's summaries of bills proposed in CA over the last year. For example, in May of 2018, Nancy sent out a statewide advocacy email sharing AAUW's endorsement of SB1284, which would require large employers to "identify pay ine-

quality through data collection". The data would be used to "compile and report aggregate pay data based on gender, race and ethnicity". Employers would be empowered "spot and correct pay imbalances internally", which is "good for women, families and the economy". As of August 16, 2019, SB1284 was in committee and under submission

Her non-partisan overview of the state initiatives will provide you with a better understanding of how they came about, who proposed them, the most up to date pros and



cons. Learn how AAUW decided whether to remain "neutral", "support", or take "no position" on each. Please join us to get answers to your questions from the AAUW perspective. 

President's Message

Looking back – greater numbers of women ran for office in 1992, who were angry about the sexist treatment of African-American law professor Anita Hill by an all-male, all-white Senate Judiciary Committee. They won a record number of congressional seats.



Moving Forward - backed by Maggie's List (Republican) and Emily's List (Democrat), female political candidate numbers have increased significantly since 2016. Republican senatorial candidate numbers increased by 163%, House candidates by nearly 19.5%, and 675% more Republican women are running for governor. Democrat senatorial candidate numbers increased by nearly 71 %, House candidates by 151 %, and 1,175% more women Democrats are running for Governor.

Additionally, the field of women running for office is becoming more diverse. If she wins, Deb Haaland, a Native American running for Congress in NM District 1 will be the first Native American ever to hold a congressional seat. Stacey Adams could become the first black female governor if she wins her race in Georgia; Vermont gubernatorial candidate Christine Hallquist could the country's first transgender governor, if she wins in November; and Paulette Jordan could become the country's first Native American governor in Idaho. Nearly 50 black women are running for Congress as well. By electing women to political office, it paves the path for other women to follow. Many younger women are running for office, because they are unhappy with their own political parties, and they've channeled their anger into planning a replacement of seasoned, multi-termed incumbent men. They may win, given their passionate desire to substantially change the way incumbents have done business in the past. Maggie's List and Emily's List are helping them to do that.

This passion-into-action strategy bodes well for the AAUW public policy Issues we advocate for:

<u>Civil Rights</u> – AAUW advocates for equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society.

<u>Education</u> – AAUW supports a strong system of public education that promotes gender fairness, equity, and diversity.

Economic Security - AAUW advocates for all women to achieve economic self-sufficiency.

<u>Title IX</u> - AAUW vigorously supports enforcement of Title IX and all other civil rights laws pertaining to education.

Over the summer the STEM committee started planning the 16th Annual STEM Career Conference for 7th and 8th grade girls from predominately Title I middle schools, to be held on Friday, February 22, 2019. Raquel Sanchez is the newest co-



chair, joining Mary Lamo and Frances Rozner. Raquel is a past STEM workshop speaker and will bring her enthusiasm, perspective, and professional skills to this role.

We will hold the event at Long Beach City College, Liberal Arts Campus, with a new location for the plenary and concluding sessions - the small gym. In 2019 we will again partner with the seven 2018 middle schools. At this point, we have guarantees for 9 of our 10 workshop speakers, with both returning and new speakers. The Chairs interviewed an impressive young woman for our Keynote speaker and she accepted. Her focus on determination, goal setting and helping others will deliver a powerful message to the attendees. The sub-committee chairs are meeting on September 26 to work out the details needed to deliver an inspiring conference that will give the girls the opportunity to learn about STEM
