During the holiday meals when I was in elementary school, my maternal grandmother, great aunts and my mom shared stories about the challenging lives of women living in Wyoming. These particular female relatives arrived in WY in the late 1890's and early 1900's. Considering that they grew up living great distances from their Midwest and east coast birthplaces, the women who moved west had to make the best of extreme weather, lack of accessible healthcare, comforts of home and protection from danger of all kinds.

The survival and success of European settlers in western lands would not have been possible without the contributions of women who worked side by side with men to build communities, farms, cattle ranches and commerce in the Territory of Wyoming. At least that was the story I believed at the time.

I've since learned that there were racial issues included in the contentiousness of national suffrage and voting rights. For example, women's suffrage efforts were strong in Kansas, members of the Republican party there supported suffrage for Black men but denied the right to vote for women. Democrats opposed granting full citizenship and voting rights to emancipated Black slaves after the Civil War in the south, as well as free Black men in the northern states. In 1869, Union Army General Ulysses S. Grant appointed Republican Attorney General Joseph Carey to the Territory of WY, who "issued an official legal opinion that no one in WY could be denied the right to vote based on race". Although WY Democrats felt that this move was used by the Republicans to guarantee their election to office by Black voters, the Democrats elected a representative to Congress and took all 22 state legislative seats.

Additionally, by pushing for women to gain the right to vote for the first time, the all-white male Democrat legislators hoped to attract more women to the state and expected them to continue to vote for Democrats. They also passed laws providing equal pay for female and male teachers and guaranteed married women separate property rights from men. Sounds very attractive. Women were finally allowed to vote in the second Territory election in 1870. When the 1,000 women showed up to cast their ballots, they surprised the Democrats and elected a Republican representative to Congress and a few Republican men to the legislature as well. Black men were also allowed to vote for the first time. However, sadly, Native Americans were not.

One of the early settlers in WY was Louisa Ann Swain of Laramie, WY. Ms. Swain was the first woman to cast a vote in a general election on September 6, 1870 in WY, <u>50 years before the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment</u> (on August 18, 1920) allowing women in the US the right to vote. WY was one of the first 36 states to ratify the Amendment. My mother, Eda Beatrice Laughlin, was born in WY - 5 years after the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment was ratified. I am a WY native as well.

Luckily for me, Frances Rozner shared information about the Pasadena 2020 Celebration at the end of September. The National Women's History Alliance is sponsoring a Rose Parade float to commemorate the Centennial of the ratification of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment. I donated to the organization for the purpose of representing the State of WY and will walk with the other 35 state representatives beside the float during the Rose Parade on January 1, 2020 in Pasadena!


Walking with me will be a representative of the Arapaho Nation, who resides in WY. I will wear the white suffrage long dress and hat; she will be wearing what has been described to me as something reflective of Native American dress. I couldn't be happier to represent the strong women of WY and am so proud that this part of the world which was so ahead of its time. Just look for the Statue of Liberty with all the white dressed suffragettes walking beside her.
