Vivian Malauulu is the first Latina elected to the Long Beach Community College District Board of Trustees. She was a journalism

professor at LBCC, and today she is the board's current president. Bridgett D. Lewis, Manager of Security Operations at the Port of Long Beach, has a dual role: She oversees security operations at the nation's busiest seaport, as well serving as the Director of the Central California Maritime Coordination Center (MCC). Robin Thorne founded DemoChicks, a non-profit which encourages young women to consider a career in the construction, engineering, building, and demolition industries. 

### What is The Status of the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) Today?

"Equality of rights under the law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any states on account of sex".

The nonprofit, Equal Means Equal, (equalmeansequal.org) filed suit in the US District Court in Boston, in November of 2019, challenging the limitation of time for signing the ERA from the original measure passed in 1972. The time limitation is not part of the amendment; therefore, it is argued that the time limitation is not binding. The organization argues that the 27<sup>th</sup> Amendment to the Constitution (forbidding Congress from giving itself raises) wasn't passed for over 200 years, so why should this effort be time limited? The



lawsuit was filed as a reaction to the lawsuit filed by the attorneys general for the states of Alabama, South Dakota and Louisiana, who argue that abortion rights activists would claim discrimination if abortion rights continue to be curtailed. Additionally, more conservative states are concerned about the use of women-only restrooms and locker rooms by transgendered women.

The state of Virginia votes on the ERA on January 20, 2020 and is expected to file the resolution with the National Archives and Records Administration immediately, a process which is expected to be protested by opponents to the ERA. US archivist, David Ferriero intends to ask for direction from the Department of Justice. Five states which have already passed the ERA, Nebraska, Tennessee, Idaho, South Dakota have considered rescinding their initial ratification of the ERA. The practice of rescinding their original support of the

ERA may not succeed, given that prior precedents set by the courts have prohibited this action.

### **Board Meeting December 2019**



**Jennifer Brodmann, Ph.D.** is an assistant professor with the College of Business Administration & Public Policy at CSU Dominguez Hills. A graduate of the University of New Orleans where she studied fine arts until she discovered entrepreneurial finance. She then successfully pursed her doc-



torate in this academic area of study. Her study of entrepreneurial finance is dear to her heart because of the obvious implicit bias against women and minorities who seek entrepreneurial funding to start their own business. She conducts research to expose the inequality common in accessing capital in starting a business.

In fact, funding teams tend to have the male partner make the pitch to investors because men are more likely to be successful. Jennifer points out that there are signs bias may be shifting as investors are realizing that they may be overlooking segments of the population, i.e, women and minorities. Her passion is not only to expose inequitable practices but to advocate for game changing

policies to benefit the underserved, and to mentor women and minorities in their fight. Jennifer is impressively motivated to help overcome longstanding obstacles and make the financial world more equitable for women and minority entrepreneurs!
