Black or African American History Month is an annual celebration of achievements and historical contributions of the Black community. In 1915, Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson and the prominent minister Jesse E. Moorland founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH). Today, the organization is known as the Association of the Study of African American Life and History (ASALH). In February of 1926, the group

sponsored a national Negro Week. Schools and communities were inspired to organize local celebrations which started the annual observance. Since 1976, February is designated as Black History Month. This year's theme is, "Black Family: Representation, Identity and Diversity".

Our program will feature two dynamic women who are breaking barriers to expand diversity and opportunity. Dr. Sabrina Sanders is a 20-year veteran of higher education and currently serves as the Director of Student Affairs Projects and Initiatives at the CSU Chancellor's office. Her professional expertise encompasses equity programs, assessment, leadership development, student health and psychological services, international student programs, athletic academic support services, Title IX, admissions, and student conduct. Robin Thorne is the founder and CEO of CTI Environmental, a com-





pany that specializes in construction management. This successful, multi-million-dollar company is based here in Long Beach where Robin is a long-time community leader. AAUW National Board of Directors Seeks Comments on Eliminating Degree Requirement for Membership

AAUW National Board President Julie T. Brown invited AAUW members to submit comments by February 5th regarding the proposal to eliminate degree requirements for membership. Below is the text of the Board of Directors' statement on open membership and the timeline for consideration of this issue including the duration of the voting period (note February 5th comment deadline):

- The AAUW National Board of Directors strongly supports elimination of the degree requirement for membership and will put the requirement up for a membership vote this spring. This important change is a critical step in bringing AAUW's bylaws and membership requirement in line with our mission of advancing equity for women and girls. While AAUW is fiercely committed to the educational attainment of all women, given our commitment to inclusion, this is simply the right thing to do.
- Proposals to eliminate the degree requirement for membership have come before the membership for vote a number of times. The Board feels very strongly that while the degree requirement made perfect sense at AAUW's inception, this requirement is now counter to our mission, and limits our ability to build the capacity needed to increase our impact as an organization.
- Members can comment on the proposed amendment through February 5, 2021 5:00 PM ET.
 Voting will open on April 7, 20210 and close May 17, 2021 5:00 PM ET.
- We encourage respectful debate that has always been a hallmark of the AAUW community.
 <u>ADD A COMMENT</u> to let the AAUW Board know of your thoughts on this proposal and exercise your vote this spring. Key Dates:

February 5, 2021- Comments submitted by 5:00 pm ET will be reviewed by the Board of Directors prior to their final vote on the bylaws amendment
April 7, 2021 - Voting opens
May 17, 2021 - Voting closes at 5:00 pm ET

Voted on at meeting on January 9, 2021-ByLaws Amendment.

At the request of the Executive Committee, Denise Montoya moved that the Membership approve the revision of Article IX Section 1.a. as shown with the addition of text in boldface and the text deleted as noted by strikeover.

Section 1.a. Nominations.

a. There shall be a nominating committee of at least five members, consisting of the Immediate Past President as Advisor with the remaining four members **and committee Chair** appointed by the President who will convene the first meeting. The first meeting shall occur no later than October 1 each year.

The motion was passed by 31 (97%) affirmative votes with 1 (3%) abstaining vote.

Human Trafficking

January 11, 2021 is National Human Trafficking Awareness Day. AAUW California supports efforts to combat Human Trafficking, as noted in our Public Policy Priorities: "Freedom from violence and fear of violence, including …human trafficking…in homes, schools, workplaces and communities..."

Human Trafficking is the third largest organized criminal activity in the world. Human Trafficking is a modern-day form of slavery, with an estimated number of victims in the millions. Whether for labor or sex, men, women, and children are manipulated through force, fraud and coercion.


Research shows that people of color, especially the Black community, are more likely to experience some form of sex trafficking. Racial and economic biases drive both social and legal presumptions of "victims" having chosen their situation.

Law enforcement efforts against human trafficking are stronger today than in 2017, but still inadequate. Globally, definitions of human trafficking vary from country to country. Even using the term "slavery" is met with opposition in cases of forced marriages and cross border smuggling.

In California, legislation in the past few years includes support for victims, updating school health curriculum, and addressing hospitality industry training. But legislation is not the key unless the public is educated as to the enormity of the issues, both locally and globally.

AAUW Response to Attack on Capitol

On Wednesday, January 6, 2021, we watched as the President of the United States incited a mob to march on the Capitol to attempt to overturn the results of an election he lost eight weeks ago. We watched in horror as that mob of white nationalists stormed the U.S. Capitol building. And we watched as they tried, and failed, to subvert our democracy, leaving a trail of wreckage and terror in their wake.

This was not the beginning. This was an inflection point in years of hate and division incited by a President who does not care about our country or its people, but only about himself. He has stoked racism, sexism, antisemitism, Islamophobia, ableism, xenophobia, toxic masculinity, and more — allowing those who share his beliefs to come out in the open and act without fear of repercussions and wreak havoc on the seat of democracy. The failed insurrection at the Capitol this week was shocking, but not without warning.

We come together today as a community of multi-racial, multi-generational, differently-classed gender justice leaders, who represent women, girls and gender nonconforming people from every corner of this nation, united in condemnation of these unconscionable actions. Together, we demand that our country's leaders uphold their Constitutional responsibilities and remove President Trump from office immediately. He must be held accountable. He has shown that he is an imminent threat to all of our communities, our nation and our very democracy. We cannot risk one more day under this President.

Now is the time for our leaders to do what is right and fulfill your obligation to the American people who elected you. The House of Representatives has committed to beginning impeachment proceedings, and the Senate must show up with a unified voice to swiftly do the same. If you fail to condemn white nationalists' violent extremism and hold the President accountable for his actions, you are neglecting your basic responsibility to serve the American people. Vice President Pence, members of the Cabinet, and Members of Congress, you each swore to "support and defend the Constitution of the United States." This is the moment for which that oath was written. And if you fail to protect this country, women and girls across this country will not forget.
