PROCLAMATION

In recognition of

WOMEN'S EQUALITY DAY

~ ~ ~

Whereas the women of the United States have been treated as second-class citizens and have not been entitled the full rights and privileges, public or private, legal or institutional, which are available to male citizens of the United States; and

Whereas the women of the United States have united to assure that these rights and privileges are available to all citizens equally regardless of sex; and

Whereas the women of the United States have designated August 26, the anniversary date of the certification of the Nineteenth Amendment, as the symbol of the continued fight for equal rights; and

Whereas the women of United States are to be commended and supported in their organizations and activities;

Therefore now be it Resolved, I, Mayor Robert Garcia, on behalf of the City Council, along with the American Association of University Women, Long Beach Branch, do hereby recognize and proclaim August 26th as Women's Equality Day, in commemoration of that day in 1920, on which the women of America were first given the right to vote, and that day in 1970, on which a nationwide demonstration for women's rights took place.

Branch History

From the website:

AAUW Long Beach has a long and prestigious history.

We celebrated *100 Years* in 2020!!

Our history through 2005 as documented by Norma Grady is [available as a PDF](#) on the AAUW Long Beach website. You will need [Adobe Acrobat](#) to read the file. A brief synopsis is copied below. Is there anything more you can add!

1920 – 1940:

The small group of college-educated women who had formed the College Women's Club of Long Beach in 1911 became affiliated with the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, forbear of AAUW, in 1920. Given that this was the same year that the 20th Amendment extended voting rights to all American women, the Branch joined with the League of Women Voters to establish a school for voters. During these early years they also created a Toy Loan Library, an Inter-Club Legislature, a city-wide Creative Arts Festival, and a Community Arts Survey. The Branch's focus on education emerged early—in the 1920s members were holding Scholarship Teas and raising money for scholarships.

1941 – 1945:

During World War II, the Branch set up a Speakers Bureau in connection with consumer research, worked with the YWCA in finding rooms for defense workers, bought \$5000 in War Bonds, and, with American Women's Volunteer Service, established, helped furnish, and staffed a Servicewomen's Club.

1945 – 1970:

In the post-war years, AAUW-Long Beach conducted a survey of recreational facilities that resulted in supervised playgrounds, updated the Arts Survey of Long Beach, and did a study of juvenile problems in Lakewood, resulting in supervised recreation in Pan-American Park. Members began a Braille Transcribing Section that produced hundreds of books for blind students.

Branch Business from July 19 Board Meeting

Motion to change signatures at Bank of America Account: Pat Ferrer moved to change our Bank of America account (number ending in 3633) by removing past Co-President Jeanne Caveness and Secretary Linda Westman and replacing them with new Co-President Virginia Baxter and Secretary Anne Supple. Charlotte Joseph seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Motion to Approve Branch Membership to Authorize Funding for Frances Magarian Scholarship Program:

JoAnn Kuroda moved, on behalf of the Scholarship Committee, the Board of Directors recommend to the Branch membership to authorize the following funding for the AAUW Long Beach Frances Magarian Scholarship Program for the next five years: Authorize the use of 100% of the net income from any Author's Day Event, and, if not sufficient, from the Reserve Fund, and, if not sufficient, from the principal of the Endowment Fund, not to exceed \$30,000 over a period of five years.

A friendly amendment was approved to add the following: 3. ***If still not sufficient, from personal solicitation*** 4. ***As a last resort*** from the principal of the Endowment Fund not to exceed \$30,000.

Charlotte Joseph moved to accept the motion as amended. The motion passed.

The motion as amended reads as follows:

The Board of Directors recommends to the Branch membership to authorize the following funding for the AAUW Long Beach Frances Magarian Scholarship Program for the next five years:

Authorize the use of 100% of the net income from any Author's Day Event,

If not sufficient, from the Reserve Fund,

If still not sufficient, from personal solicitation,

As a last resort, from the principal of the Endowment Fund, not to exceed \$30,000.

Motion to approve Tech Trek fundraiser at the January 2022 Branch Meeting: Valerie Armstrong moved, by direction of the Tech Trek Special Project Committee, that the Board approve the Tech Trek Committee's proposed fundraising amount of \$5,000, and that fundraising occur during January, 2022. The motion passed.

Motion to approve fundraising for 2021-22 STEM Conference: Deloris Mayuga moved, by direction of the STEM Conference Committee, that the committee be permitted to fundraise for the annual STEM Conference in February 2022. The motion passed.

Motion to strike Work Smart from Policies and Procedures: Frances Rozner moved that 18.d. i-iii (Branch Projects/AAUW Work Smart in Long Beach) be stricken from Policies and Procedures. Pat Ferrer seconded. The motion passed.

Motion to transfer Work Smart balance to the Reserve Fund: Frances Rozner moved that the remaining \$229.54 in the Branch's Work smart Fund be transferred to the branch's Reserve Fund. Pat Ferrer seconded the motion. The motion passed.

Motion to approve expenses for Author's Luncheon: Ginny Baxter moved to approve expenditures for the Author's Luncheon prior to the Spring, 2022 event.

Charlotte Joseph seconded the motion. A friendly amendment was approved to include the words ***not to exceed \$1,000.***

The amended motion to approve expenditures for the Author's Luncheon, not to exceed \$1,000, prior to the Spring, 2022 event passed.

Motion to authorize expenses and proceeds of the Author's Luncheon for scholarships. Ginny Baxter moved to approve using Author's Luncheon proceeds for scholarships for the 2022-2023 fiscal year. Charlotte Joseph seconded. The motion passed.



STEM Career Conference – 2022 Update

We plan to hold our next STEM Career Conference for 7th and 8th grade girls on Friday, February 25, 2022 at Long Beach City College. The Long Beach school district has been requested to approve this activity. We expect an answer shortly after the district office

Tech Trek Update

As a result of concerns regarding COVID-19 and the impact of directives from national, state and local leaders, AAUW California held a virtual Tech Trek program this summer.

AAUW Long Beach invited 18 students from Muir Academy and Hamilton Middle School to attend the virtual program. These students were recommended by their science or math teachers. The students from Muir Academy were selected for Tech Trek in 2020, but the camp was cancelled due to COVID-19. Of those 18 students, two students persevered through the online application process and attended the 5-day camp, which was conducted via Zoom.



The camp was centered on a morning project-based robotics/engineering/coding class that met daily. After lunch, the campers heard from inspirational women for an hour, then participated in one or more 90-minute interactive science, technology, engineering, and math workshops. They had the option to return for evening workshops which included social activities or parent sessions.

Genesis Hernandez, an 8th grader at Muir Academy in West Long Beach, enjoyed the virtual program. "I think my favorite thing about Tech Trek had to be the guest speakers. I loved how they talked about their struggles and how they overcame them without giving up."

The Tech Trek committee has not yet received information regarding camp for the summer of 2022. We will provide updates when received from the AAUW California State Coordinators.
