EXTENDING THE MAGIC OF THE HOLIDAY SEASON TO ALL GROUPS

Many religious and secular holidays will be observed during the upcoming winter months, providing opportunities to recognize and appreciate the richness of living in a multicultural society. It can also create underlying tensions when groups feel their holidays are not appreciated.

AAUW's efforts to create diversity, equity, and inclusion within our organization and the larger society we live in, call for us to consider how to make holiday celebrations more meaningful and inclusive. Here are some suggestions to foster understanding and awareness of each other's holiday traditions:

- Create a multicultural committee.
- Be respectful of how people observe different religious holidays. Avoid scheduling mistakes by checking an interfaith, multicultural calendar or winter celebrations calendar.
- Provide food options that respect different dietary and cultural needs.
- Seek ways to make decorations inclusive and explain the religious traditions they represent.
- Make gift exchanges optional as they may cause disappointment for the recipient or hardships for the giver.
- Create awareness of different customs throughout the year.
- Invite feedback and member suggestions for next year's celebrations.
- Don't be too hard on yourself for inevitable omissions and oversights.

Five-Star Briefing

All 5-Star Branches were invited to attend a zoom meeting to meeting new AAUW National President, Gloria Blackwell. She shared that National has piloted a number of new programs focusing on social change. Although our branch no longer has Start Smart on a local level, AAUW national, through a grant from Coca Cola, has expanded financial literacy. They will be able to train over 1000 women and girls on the perils of student loan debt, investment strategies and one on one coaching. They have focused policy efforts with information on Latinas, (https://www.aauw.org/resources/research/latina-initiative/) showing the impact of COVID on women and studying local efforts. The pandemic has caused a reversal of the pay gap achievement.

The brochure from National, "Deeper in Debt" highlights student debt among black females and studies the rationale of student loan forgiveness. They have established "Hispanic History Month" on Social Media highlighting 30 women in 30 days. There will be a series of other webinars addressing policies and grantees.

AND...Did you know? This year is the Centennial of Marie Curie's reception of the Nobel Prize. AAUW was responsible for raising the funds to give her 1 gram of radium! We have continued our efforts to advance women in higher education by studying female faculty compensation with a grant from the National Science Foundation.
