






Pay Equity Day was March 15th and marked the date that women must work into 2022 to finally reach the pay men received last year.

We've long known that on average, women in the workforce take home less than men—an average of 83 percent—and that many women of color are paid far less. Historically, Equal Pay Day has been calculated



Women over the past two years, especially women of color, were pushed into part-time or seasonal work or out of the workforce all together. Because of this, past methods of calculating the wage gap fell short of accurately capturing the full picture. For 2022, the Equal Pay Day coalition has adopted a new, more inclusive methodology. This encompasses a broader cross-section of women, including those who work part time or seasonally, to represent a more accurate picture of how the gender pay gap impacts diverse communities. The bipartisan Paycheck Fairness Act—which passed the U.S. House of Representatives in 2021—needs your support to reach the finish line. The **Senate** must move this bill forward to ensure all women have the tools they need to challenge discrimination and all employers have the incentives they need to comply with the law. National Member Dues Update:

In October 2020, the AAUW National Board of Directors approved dues increases for

Fiscal Years 2022-2024. The dues rose by \$3 effective July 1, 2021, will rise \$5 this upcoming year effective July 1, 2022, and will increase \$5 effective July 1, 2023, making the total dues amount for these years \$62, \$67 and \$72, respectively. The board felt this measure was essential for AAUW to continue its mission to achieve gender equity and preserve the viability of the organization. All but \$3 of your annual dues remains tax deductible. Current life members will not be affected by this change. New life memberships will reflect the higher dues' amounts. College and university membership fees will remain unchanged.

You will be able to renew your regular membership in the amount of \$113 (National \$67 + State \$20 + Branch \$26) from your Snapshot Menu.
