Diversity Corner

Welcome to 2023! Whatever your new year plans are, let's keep our minds and bodies engaged. With that said, let's do an exercise: What do the following statements have in common?

"Don't you want a family?"

"Where are you from?"

"You have a mental illness, but you seem so normal."

Do some of these statements sound familiar? These are all examples of microaggressions.

What are microaggressions? They are verbal, behavioral, or environmental actions (whether

intentional or not) that communicate hostility toward oppressed/targeted groups including people of color, women, LGBTQIA+ persons, persons with disabilities, and religious minorities (Nadal, 2014). In other words, people may demonstrate their biases and prejudices in more subtle ways, otherwise known as microaggressions (Sue, 2007). Microaggressions can happen even with good intent.

According to Sue, there are three types of microaggressions:

Microassaults are overt forms of discrimination in which individuals deliberately behave in discriminatory ways. They may think that their actions are unnoticed or unharmful. For example, when someone says, "That's so gay!" to suggest that something is weird, the person is aware of the words that they choose. However, they may not realize that using such language is considered offensive.

Microinsults are statements or behaviors in which individuals unconsciously communicate discriminatory messages to members of target groups. For instance, a person might tell an Asian American that they "speak good English", implying that Asian Americans do not speak English well. This phenomenon can be specially upsetting to Asian Americans who do not speak any other language besides English.

Microinvalidations are verbal statements that deny, negate, or undermine the realities of members of target groups. For example, when a person tells a BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and people of color) individual that racism does not exist, that person is invalidating and denying the BIPOC person's racial reality.

Why does this matter? Research continues to show that microaggressions contribute to poorer health outcomes, particularly among BIPOC folx. Studies show increased rates of depression, prolonged stress and trauma, anxiety, heart disease and type 2 diabetes. In response, here are a few things we can do to decrease microaggressions:

1) Examine your beliefs, 2) Acknowledge other people's feelings, 3) Embrace empathy, and 4) Try not to get defensive. For more helpful tips, check out this handout:

As members of the Long Beach Branch of AAUW, we believe in the mission to further equity and opportunity for women and girls. So, it is good to know what we have accomplished towards this mission by contributing to the AAUW Fund. Monies donated to the Greatest Needs

Fund are applied to these strategic priorities of AAUW: Education & Training, Economic Security, Leadership, and Governance & Sustainability.

To get a better sense of what that means, here are some powerful impact numbers to share with you.

188,000 individuals have participated in AAUW's salary negotiation programs such as "Work Smart", which has enabled the participants to increase their economic security and improve opportunities for themselves and their families. In fact, 145 colleges and universities, including 32 minority serving institutions and historically black colleges offer these programs.

Over \$6 million has been awarded to 320 women in grants and fellowships due to the fully endowed Fellowship & Grants Fund. This is a record for AAUW. Never before have we been able to assist women to this extent to achieve their educational goals which enables them to take advantage of greater opportunities.

The Fund has enabled more women to take a seat at the table in critical conversations advancing gender equity for women and girls. These include the White House Gender Policy Council, Speaker Pelosi's Women's History Month Celebrations, and the UN NGO Commission on the Status of Women, among others. More women are taking leadership and governance roles.

Now, pat yourselves on the back for supporting the AAUW mission. Together we can break barriers and make a difference!

Greta Casino is a Career Development Grant recipient funded in part from our Joyce E. Clark Research & Projects Endowment. This grant provides \$2,000-\$20,000 in funding to women who hold a bachelor's degree and are preparing to advance or change careers or re-enter the workforce in education; health and medical sciences; science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM); or social sciences. Primary consideration is given to women of color and women pursuing their first advanced degree or credentials in nontraditional fields. Funds are available for tuition, fees, books, supplies, local transportation and dependent care.

Grants support course work beyond a bachelor's degree, including a master's degree, second bachelor's degree, certification program or specialized training in technical or professional fields. Course work must be taken at a college or university in the United States or at a technical school that is licensed or accredited by the U.S. Department of Education. Funds are not available for doctorate-level work.

AAUW Long Beach Awards Five Frances Magarian Scholarships

Smiles shone all around at a recent AAUW Long Beach Branch meeting when three CSULB students attended accepting a Frances Magarian Scholarship award of \$2,500 each. This program established in 2013 fulfills the bequest intent of its namesake by giving two CSULB and two LBCC students aid in their education. This year an anonymous donor presented the branch with an additional scholarship for a third CSULB student. Long Beach City College students unable to attend, receiving \$500 awards are: LaQuandra Harris, majoring in Sociology and Psychology, and Tanya Fuentez, majoring in Administration of Justice.

A tradition of the Frances Magarian Scholarship program is to ask the scholars to speak about their background, majors, and goals for the future. Chloee Gong a Computer Science major, Alexxandra Hurtado a Molecular Cell Biology major, and Diana Than a Psychology major all expressed their appreciation to AAUW Long Beach for helping

The price of attending camp is expected to go up this year. UCSB is asking for \$1150 per camper and Whittier College is requesting \$1200 per camper.
