the mother of a four year old, who also takes care of her five year old brother since her handicapped father, who also lives with her, is incapable of caring for him. She is a nursing student with a GPA of 4.0 and 3.5 the past two semesters.

Both women had excellent recommendations and the scholarships will go a long way to ease their financial burdens.

## AAUW Fund

**4450-Education & Training Fund** addresses barriers that prevent women from thriving in school and pursuing rewarding careers. Contributions to this fund champion equal access to education and training to achieve life goals.

Girls experience gender stereotypes to varying degrees throughout their childhood which become fully institutionalized in the education system. When girls start school, they frequently encounter subtle messages about their academic abilities and future potential. Students of color and low-income families face additional biases that limit their opportunity.



As early as elementary school, girls face barriers that ultimately hinder their achievement, particularly in math and science. As a result, they enter college, gravitating toward college majors that prepare them for lower-paying fields, and away from the STEM fields that lead to higher paying jobs. While women now surpass men in earning degrees, research shows that women are disproportionally represented in 6 of the 10 lowest-paying college majors, while 9 of the 10 highest-paying majors (all in the STEM fields) are dominated by men.

Addressing educational inequality requires an intersectional approach: understanding how discrimination based on race, gender, class, orientation, and ability compounds to create additional barriers for students.

A future of equal opportunity and equal rewards in the workforce starts with the educational system. It is critical to remove gender-based barriers that keep not only girls but all students from pursuing their dreams and reaching their potential. Schools must teach with an eye toward tomorrow's economy: The fastest growing, most well-paid sectors require technology, math, and science expertise that many female students and students of color are not getting. The education system also needs to support the demand for soft skills, such as problem solving, self-directed learning, communication, collaboration and creativity.

The gender pay gap and opportunities are not problems that suddenly surface when women enter the workforce. The roots of the problem run deep and correcting it entails understanding the barriers and biases that persist in our educational system. # Diversity, Equity & Inclusion

May is Older Americans Month. Older workers face particular forms of discrimination that limit their ability to earn a paycheck, and women are more vulnerable than men as they reach retirement due to a lifelong pay gap. On March 29, the AAUW-supported Protecting Older Workers Against Discrimination Act (S.1030) was reintroduced, which would give older workers the tools to battle age discrimination and continue to take home a fair wage.
