## It Could Happen to Anyone!

The October AAUW program will focus on the perpetrators of violence in intimate relationships. We will explore the reasons for violent be-



havior and the reasons to hope it can change. Guest speaker (and AAUW member) Alyce LaViolette will tell stories of the people she works with. Although most of the perpetrators of domestic violence are male, she has also worked with females who are abusive. She will talk about her own experiences doing this work and the rationale for the way she does her pro-

gram. She loves discussion and welcomes questions and comments.

Ms. LaViolette has worked with victims of intimate partner violence since 1978. In 1979, she founded one of the first programs in the country to work with abusive partners as a program of WomenShelter of Long Beach. In 1984 she went into private practice with a specialty in domestic violence and with high-conflict couples and gender issues. She has a broad-based private practice. Alyce speaks nationally and internationally and has served on the Speaker's Bureau for the U.S. Department of State. She has developed programs for the Probation Dept. in Los Angeles County and for the Department of Children and Family Services for LA and Orange Counties. Alyce has served as an expert witness in criminal, family and civil court since 1984. She appears on local and national television and radio and has co-authored one of Sage Publication's best-selling books "It Could Happen to Anyone: Why Battered Women Stay".

## Tech Trek Update

The Tech Trek Committee is gearing up for a new season, selecting 15 Title I middle schools to participate this year. Our goals this year are to increase the number of schools participating and to send 12 campers. We currently have \$12,830.00 in the Tech Trek Special Projects Fund and \$3,474.74 branch Tech Trek fund. It costs \$1,100 per camper to at Whittier College and UC Santa Barbara.

At our meeting on August 29<sup>th</sup>, the Tech Trek committee established the 2023-2024 timeline. We will contact schools and promote the program in early October and teachers will nominate students in November/ December. The nominated students will complete their online applications in January/February. The Tech Trek committee will review the applications in early March and conduct interviews by the end of March. The final selections are due by April 15, 2024.

Here is an update from the State of California's Public Policy Team.

#### The Equal Rights Amendment (ERA).

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the introduction of the ERA. AAUW's 2023-25 Public Policy Priorities state that we advocate for ratification and passage of the ERA "to guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse and inclusive society." We are happy to report that multiple paths are being pursued in the current session of Congress to affirm the ERA as the 28th amendment. Right now, we could use your help to finally make this a reality!

One of the paths that looks fruitful for advancing the ERA is passage of a discharge petition for House Joint Resolution 25 (H.J. Res. 25). This will allow there to be a vote to remove the current ratification deadline for the ERA. Here in California there are two members of Congress who are a focus of critical outreach because of their demonstrated bipartisanship:

CA-13 Rep. John Duarte and CA-41 Rep. Ken Calvert

If your branch is in one of these districts, please ask your members to reach out to your representative and urge them to sign the discharge petition H.J. Res. 25. When you call, make sure to note that you are a constituent. If you are not sure what to say, you are welcome to use the message below:

We're asking for your office to sign the discharge petition on House Joint Resolution 25 (H.J. Res. 25). This would simply allow there to be a vote on the resolution to remove the ratification deadline and affirm the Equal Rights Amendment as the 28th Amendment to the Constitution.

### Motions passed at the Long Beach Branch Meeting on September 9, 2023.

1) Frances Rozner moved that Standing Rule 6.b. first sentence be amended as follows: All members attending branch program meetings *conducted in a facility requiring meal guarantees* pay a fee. (currently: All members attending branch program meetings pay a fee.)

Anne Supple seconded. The motion passed.

2) Deloris Mayuga, VP, Investments moved that by direction of the Board for FY 22/23 that the Endowment Fund interest dividend and realized capital **not** be transferred into the Reserve Account as specified in Policy and Procedures. No second required. The motion passed.

# AAUW Fund

We can all take pride that AAUW is the nation's leading organization advocating for equity in higher education and women's economic empowerment. It was founded in 1881 by determined women who challenged society's norms by earning college degrees. We continue to challenge norms by working to increase women's access, opportunity, and equity in higher education through research and philanthropy of over \$140 million, which in turns benefits society.



The **Current Population Survey recently** compared full-time, year-round workers and found women took home only 84% of the pay that men did—a figure that is not statistically different from 2020's pay gap. When compared to the pay of white, non-Hispanic men, the inequity is even greater for specific groups of women.

- Latina women workers are paid 52 cents for every dollar.
- Black women workers are paid 66 cents for every dollar.
- White women workers, who are paid 74 cents for every dollar.
- Asian American women workers are paid 89 cents for every dollar.

The wage gap for women overall is 11,450. This is money that could be put into the economy by spending on childcare, paying off student debt, investing in home ownership, or saving for retirement – benefiting women and the society at large.
