# STEM Career Conf. 2024 by Darlene Daclan, STEM Volunteer Coord.

We continue to sign up volunteers to assist at the branch's 20th annual AAUW Long Beach Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) Career Conference. The Conference is scheduled for **Friday afternoon, February 23,** 2024, at the Sato Academy of Mathematics and Science. The Conference provides an opportunity for 7th and 8th grade girls from Long Beach schools to participate in interactive workshops



presented by women in STEM careers. From this experience, we anticipate the girls will be motivated to attend college and inspired to pursue careers in STEM fields.

This event requires volunteers to be successful. Below are descriptions of volunteer roles we are looking for:

• **Speaker Assistants:** Formerly known as a Facilitator, Speaker Assistants help speakers with their workshops and keep the classroom (and attendees) orderly.

• **School Assistants:** School Assistants help to seat the attendees in the auditorium and assist the Middle School representatives with handing out name badges, goodie bags, and snack bags. This job includes guiding the attendees to their workshops and collecting thank you cards and evaluation forms.

• **Photographer:** A photographer takes photos of key elements at the Conference. Photos focusing on the speakers presentation and workshop activities and the girls participation in the activities are particularly important. A photographer also curates, labels and provides the photos to the Chairs.

• **Goodie Bag Preparation:** Volunteers meet prior to the Conference to prepare bags for the attendees. This job includes stuffing conference goodie bags with donated items and preparing folders w/ flyers. The bags are handed out to the attendees at the Conference.

• **Arrival Greeters:** Volunteers greet the buses upon arrival and guide the attendees to the auditorium. They assist with guiding all attendees to the event locations and to the appropriate workshops.

• **Student Guides:** Volunteers assist with guiding students to the event locations and to the appropriate workshops.

• **Conference Set Up - Directing and Signage:** Volunteers post signs around the campus and classroom areas to direct attendees to the Conference. They assist with guiding all attendees to the event locations and to the appropriate workshops.

Qualified Charitable Donation from your Individual Retirement Account – Federal law allows people aged 70 1/2 or older to make direct transfers up to \$100,000 per year per person to charitable organizations from their IRA, without the withdrawal being treated as taxable income. To start, first contact your IRA custodian and follow their procedures to request a "Qualified Charitable Distribution." The check sent must be accompanied by your name and address information in order for you to receive a written acknowledgement from National. Please provide the recipient information below to your custodian, along with our Tax ID #52-6037388. ### Highlighting Equal Pay Day for Native American Women - November 30th

Issue: Native American women working full-time, year-round, earn only 59 cents for every dollar paid to non-Hispanic white men. This disparity widens to 55 cents when considering all earners, including part-time and seasonal workers.

**Our Goal:** Address and reduce this wage gap through informed policy-making and advocacy.
