Our AAUW branch is deeply saddened by the attacks in Israel and the Gaza Strip. So many innocent lives have been lost and continue to be lost. As a non-partisan organization, we try to welcome people from all nationalities, religion, and cultures. Our deepest sympathies with those affected by the violence, with hopes that the conflict will be resolved soon.

We hope that you had an opportunity to see the program from last month, with our very own Alyce Violette, LMFT. She talked about perpetrators of violence in intimate relationships, and shared powerful stories about how perpetrators present and the people they hurt. This engaging event helped us understand how we continue to "blame the victim" and how we need to understand the dynamics of this difficult issue.

They both faced staggering challenges to leading normal lives as professional women, all the while struggling with leaving loved ones in their home country. This is particularly relevant because of the refugee crisis happening in several middle eastern countries just now.

We are really excited to be able to highlight our own Amy La, co-president, in the upcoming branch program. Dr. La will discuss mental health issues exacerbated by the Covid pandemic. The lock down made life difficult for many people, and Amy will help us work through some of it. Can't wait!




STEM Career Conference 2024

News from the State of California

We have some great news on the legislative front. AB 1078, an important bill supported by AAUW California and closely aligned with our School Board Project, was signed by Governor Gavin Newsom on September 25, 2023. AB 1078 "Instructional materials and curriculum: diversity," authored by Assembly member Dr. Corey Jackson, bans "book bans" in schools, prohibits censorship of instructional materials, and strengthens California law requiring schools to provide all students access to textbooks that teach about California's diverse communities. in leadership roles and is aligned with AAUW's mission to empower girls in traditionally male-dominated sectors. And the best part? It's free.
