

A Tribute to Mary Lamo Compiled by Karen Gustafson with member input

As visitors approached the front door to Mary Lamos' home, they might have noticed a framed print in the living room window, facing the street. In calligraphy, the print said "In a world where you



can choose to be anything, choose to be kind." Mary Lamo lived by that sentiment. She was a kind, caring, and supportive person with a slew of talents that she shared so generously with others. Mary passed away on January 11, 2024. Mary wore many hats at AAUW Long Beach. She joined in 2014 and quickly became a very active member. She was a Co-Program VP; Co-Coordinator for the Work Smart workshops that we hosted in multiple locations; Co-Chair of the STEM Career Conferences; Co-Chair of the *Energizing Potential* Study; Membership Treasurer and Co-Chair of the Yearbook publication. She received the branch's Connie Inskeep Award in 2020 and the AAUW Named Gift Honoree in 2021.

Mary was the quintessential volunteer, always asking how she could help, usually helping steadfastly from behind the scenes, especially for any task

that involved IT skills. She was in her element creating helpful Excel spreadsheets, and great with Powerpoint, too. Her spreadsheets were masterpieces. She created custom spreadsheets for a variety of projects, including multiple tools for the STEM Conference, from school registration to workshop assignments for the girls, to all the project elements and fund raising. The *Energizing Potential* study, which tracked some of our STEM students to their later academic choices, showed that our STEM conference does impact students over the long term. The statistics- based find-



ing was an important validation of our work, and also persuasive to our conference donors. Mary also created a tool for our branch Nominating Committee, tracking past leadership to enable recruiting efforts. These tools will continue to be used to benefit our branch.

She knew how to lead volunteers and how to strategize. If you had Mary on your project, it was sure to succeed. She was a fierce advocate for girls in STEM, for women in the world, and for all-around justice.

What she accomplished with our branch is astounding. At the same time, she was a board member with the Junior League Sustainers, a board member of the Long Beach Public Library Foundation,



President of her neighborhood association, a volunteer with Food Finders, always participated in the MemorialCare Team Spirit 5K walk and assisted the Signal Hill police department with community events. Greetings AAUW Members,


