Can it Happen in Long Beach?



According to the Department of Homeland Security, "Human trafficking is modern-day slavery and involves the use of force, fraud, or coercion to obtain some type of labor or commercial sex act." While human trafficking is most often thought of as a form of sex trafficking, every year millions of men, women, and children are trafficked globally for purposes of forced labor, domestic servitude, or removal of their organs. It is estimated that human trafficking is second only to drug trafficking generating billions of dollars (footnote 1).

Another misconception about human trafficking is that it is an international issue, when in fact, it is a national issue taking place in many cities right in our backyard. The National Center for Missing & Exploited Children estimated that 1 in 6 of the 18,500 endangered runaways reported to them were likely sex trafficking victims, and that 86% of these likely sex trafficking victims were in the care of social services or foster care when they went missing.

Victims of sex trafficking vary with many victims becoming romantically involved with someone who then forces, coerces, or manipulates them into prostitution. Others are lured by modeling, or a better job. Victims can be women, men, children, U.S. citizens, and foreign nationals, with many

coming from vulnerable populations including foster youth, runaways, victims of sexual assault and domestic violence to name a few.



Our January program features Alicia Revels, Human Trafficking Coordinator with the YWCA Greater Los Angeles. The YWCA is committed to fighting human trafficking, exploitation and modern-day slavery, and provide help and resources for victims and survivors of human trafficking. Learn about the prevalence of Human Trafficking, particularly sex trafficking, in our community, what law enforcement and community agencies are doing about it, and tips for recognizing the signs of trafficking and what you can do as a concerned community member.

We are grateful to our foremothers for founding the branch and laying the foundation for its success; to our current members for continuing the quest for equity for all women and girls; and to our future members for carrying on the tradition.

As we begin the New Year there will be many opportunities to reflect on the past, present and future. The programs in the fall were wonderful and the program committee has more interesting programs planned for winter and spring. Our own STEM conference is being planned for February 23rd, and the AAUW State convention will be April 27th to 29th in Irvine. This will be a great opportunity for members to attend a convention close to home. If you haven't already done so, consider joining one, or more, of our branch interest groups. They're a great way to get to know members, learn new things, and form lasting friendships. Women's issues are very much at the forefront in the news and the struggle for equality in many areas of our lives seems to be never ending. We hope you'll become as involved as possible in the branch and in our quest for equity for women and girls.

INCORPORATION VOTE RESULTS

The results of the "every member" vote to return AAUW California to a public benefit corporation from its current status as a mutual benefit corporation has **failed**. The results are as follows:

Total AAUW California Membership: 11907
Total votes cast: 3160

Total yes votes: 3134 Total no votes: 26

California corporate regulations require that all votes cast for a mutual benefit corporation to change its status to an entity such as a public benefit corporation must be unanimous. Due to the 26 "no votes" the measure failed.

What is next? AAUW California's legal counsel has advised us that we can call for a re-vote. Prior to the second round of voting, AAUW California will provide additional detailed information to the membership and reach out to branch leaders to determine areas of clarification that need to be further addressed. The second vote will be scheduled after the Thanksgiving holiday.

If a second vote fails, AAUW California will then enter into a formal appeal process with the Commissioner of the Securities Division of the Corporations Division of the California Secretary of State's Office to petition for a change. If that appeal fails or is rejected, the only option open to AAUW California is to dissolve the current corporation and reform a new corporation as a public benefit corporation. As an affiliate of AAUW National, AAUW California must be aligned with AAUW as a public benefit corporation and cannot remain as a mutual benefit corporation.

Both of the final two options are costly and time consuming. Since the fall of 2016, AAUW California has invested over \$10,000 and over 250 volunteer hours working to resolve this issue, which includes an initial appeal to the California Secretary of State for a reversal to a public benefit corporation. The first appeal was a different process than what will need to be followed if the second vote fails.

Regarding Pay Equity: We are happy to report that new California Assembly Bill 168 goes into effect on January 1, 2018. Employers in California may no longer request salary history, in writing or in person, and they must supply, upon re-

quest, a pay scale for the position for which an applicant is applying.

- •The November 14 workshop, held at the Red Cross office, hosted by the Junior League of LB, and with only a week to publicize, had 11 registrants with 6 attending. Karen Gustafson was the first to facilitate with the new 2018 curriculum and was assisted by new branch members, Charlotte Joseph and Sonya Jackson.
