As we stand on the hope of our first woman president, please remember the contributions of Shirley Chisholm, the first Black woman to make a serious attempt at the presidency in 1972. Although criticized by many, she had was a legitimate option for the presidency—even though panned by her own party as she was a female, not male, candidate. As the first Black woman member of Congress, she broke a number of barriers. Her slogan hits today just as poignantly, "Unbought and Unbossed." We can all learn from her today.

American Indian month gives us the opportunity to honor one of our own. Here we highlight the work of Wilma Mankiller, given AAUW's highest honor from AAUW, the Achievement Award, in 1993. She had also been named an AAUW Woman of Distinction in 1990. Ms. Mankiller was the Principal Chief of the Burau of Indian Affairs, the first woman to hold that position. In 1998 she was awarded the Presidential Metal of Freedom. She worked particularly to assist in efforts for young women; with social programs, job development centers, and medical clinics. How many of us remember her work today??? Let's try and remember our history, especially



when it is so fabulous!

The address is: <u>3581 Mission Inn Ave. Riverside, CA 92501</u>. The museum opens at 10 am.


