They had two CSULB college students in tow and proceded to meet with four legislative offices.

Lynne Katz, Natalie Swit and Frances Rozner met via Zoom with Caila Pedroncelli, principal consultant for our State Senator Lena Gonzalez, on Wednesday, April 9. Depi Vidyarthi was unable to attend at the last moment because of a business obligation, but assisted the April 9 team in its preparation. The three bills presented for comment were chosen by the AAUW CA Public Policy team

and focused on ensuring that the rights and safety of our transgender sisters, along with other marginalized groups such as all women, were addressed. We were also able to educate about AAUW. Caila appreciated the AAUW Work Smart opportunity.

**Missy Maceyko**, one of our AAUW LB members, cochairs AAUW CA Public Policy as a Director, along with Director Amy Hom. Their coordination of this 2025 event was phenomenal. We look forward to having AAUW LB participating, sharing, and learning once again in 2026.



## Twelve Tech Trek Campers Selected from Valerie Armstrong, Coordinator



The Tech Trek committee is pleased to announce that 12 outstanding campers have been selected to attend camp this year. Six will attend camp at Whittier College and six will attend at UC Santa Barbara. There were 20 candidates this year from five LBUSD middle schools: Bancroft, Hamilton, Hughes, Nelson, and Powell.

There was a large response this year, with 54 nominees from seven middle schools. Out the 54 nominees, 20 completed the application by the March 1<sup>st</sup> deadline. The Tech Trek committee interviewed each of the 20 students at the school site or via Zoom. There were many outstanding candidates and difficult decisions were made, but the committee reached consensus on the top 12 campers and alternates. Four campers attend Hughes, three attend Nelson, two attend Hamilton, two attend Powell, and one attends Bancroft.

The Tech Trek committee worked collaboratively to revise the interview questions and create a fair evaluation process. The committee members are Tobi Balma, Nicole Gracie, Lynne Katz, Anne Supple, Judy Willis, and Valerie Armstrong.

Olga Doletskaya:#1193 Anna Stofflet Townsend International Fellowship: Olga is studying for a Ph.D. in Social Anthropology and Sociology at the University College in London. Her PhD project is titled (II)legal parenthood: examining the complexities of queer parenting in Russia. It explores how queer parents in Russia raise children in a hostile and authoritarian state, how they form communities of care and support, and how they navigate the main sites of institutional surveillance. There, I explore how LGBTQ+ parents in Russia have children and raise them in an authoritarian and queerphobic context. I also explore how and why queer parents choose to migrate. I am proud to be funded by the American Association of University Women (AAUW)'s International Fellowship.



Christine Vega: #1652 Louise Ruth Arbogast American Fellowship: Christine's specialty is Race, Class, Gender & Sexuality Studies at San Jose State University. Her research and community work center on Motherscholars, parents, Activisms, Spirituality, Transformational Counterspace(s), and grief positivity. She is a first-generation Chicana from Pacoima, California. She earned her Ph.D. from the University of California Los Angeles (UCLA) Graduate School of Education and Information Studies, Race & Ethnicity, a B.A.in Chicana/o & Women Gender Studies from UCLA and an M.Ed. from the University of Utah. She co-found Mothers of Color in Academia (MOCA) de UCLA and the Chicana M(other)work Collective. She is an Assistant Professor of Chicana/e/o Studies at San José State University.



**Bailey Howell: #4412 Jean Aldrich American Fellowship: Bailey** is a Ph.D. candidate in Evolutionary Biology at Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University in Blacksburg, Virginia. She is in the department of biological sciences at Virginia Tech. Her dissertation work incorporates evolutionary history and traits to predict responses to global change across lizards, relying on diverse computational models and methods. She hopes to combine her knowledge of macroevolutionary processes and constraints to determine if this information is useful to elucidate changes in functional traits due to more recent processes like urbanization. She hopes to incorporate comparative methods and trait data to understand lizards' responses to anthropogenic changes and why some species can adapt more easily than others. She hopes to grow her

skills in science communication and expand opportunities for science outreach. She is committed to broadening participation in STEM fields through science communication and community outreach.
