Supporting Women Veterans' Transition to Civilian Life

As part of our ongoing commitment to equity and empowerment, AAUW Long Beach is proud to host a meaningful and timely program on Saturday, November 1. The panel discussion will feature women veterans and service providers and is focused on the unique experiences of women veterans as they transition to civilian and academic life. The conversation will explore challenges, support systems, and opportunities for advocacy.

Why It Matters:

Women veterans are the fastest-growing segment of the veteran population projected to reach 18% by 2040. Yet their stories are often overlooked. With over two million women veterans nationwide and California ranking second in veteran population, this issue is especially relevant to our community.



Key Issues Facing Women Veterans:

- Education: 46% hold an associate degree or higher—more than male veterans.
- Mental Health: Higher rates of PTSD, depression, and military sexual trauma.
- Homelessness: From 2020–2023, homelessness among women veterans rose nearly 24%, with unsheltered rates up 48%.
- Healthcare Access: While the VA has expanded services, many women veterans report difficulty accessing gender-specific care, including reproductive health services, and face long wait times and provider shortages.

Join us to honor their service, amplify their voices, and explore how AAUW members can support their success in civilian life.

From the Co-Presidents

As we enter the month of November with a Special Election in California the results of which will have nationwide impact I am reminded of a tenet of the American Association of University Women. We are not partisan, but we are political.

We were all reminded of that by our outstanding CA Public Policy Directors Amy Hom and Missy Maceko who presented at our October branch meeting about their legislative and activist work on behalf of rights for gender equity in the economy, education, and healthcare.

Our track record of standing up for legislation that supports gender equity is well known. Our advocacy efforts have propelled legislation into laws, including: the Equal Pay Act, finally passed in 1963; the Title IX amendment in 1972; the Family and Medical Leave Act in 1993; the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2009, and an addendum to Fair Pay Act is the Paycheck Fairness Act, which was passed by the U.S. House in 2019 but is still awaiting action in the Senate. We've come a long way, but we still have a long way to go!

Also, in November we will celebrate Veterans Day and the service of our military men, women, and non-binary soldiers who put their lives on the line to defend our freedoms. At our branch meeting we will meet some of our women soldiers for a panel discussion about the current military climate and what it's like to reenter civilian life after their service to our country.



Call to Action

But we do not need to enlist or wear a uniform to also fight for our freedoms. We can do our part by promoting AAUW's Public Policy Priorities (PPP) based on gender equity and social justice by using AAUW CA toolkits and the information they provide. You can take action by:

- Increasing visibility of AAUW Long Beach by connecting with like-minded groups.
- Carry our PPP into the community. If you are part of other women-focused groups, bring AAUW into the conversation as a partner or participant in their programs.
- Grow our network by being part of AAUW tabling. Volunteer at women-focused events like the Wonder Tech Fest produced by **Wonder Women Tech on Nov. 4-6**.

Proudly carry our message forward that we are not partisan, but when it comes to women's rights in the economy, in education, in healthcare, in social justice, and in leadership... we are political.
