Philanthropic Projects and Funding

AAUW Tech Trek

- The Branch sends girls to a week-long STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering & Math) camp at a local college/university in the summer between their 7th and 8th grade years.
- The committee selects the girls from Long Beach Unified School District Title 1 middle schools
- Camperships are funded by donations from branch members, local organizations, and other supporters.

Scholarships

- Annually two (2) scholarships of \$2,500 each are awarded to California State University Long Beach students and two (2) scholarships of \$500 are given to Long Beach City College students.
- Funding is from the net income from the Author's Day event held annually each Spring. AAUW members are encouraged to attend and support the activities of Author's Day and the silent auction. Balance of funding is from funds bequeathed to the Branch by long-time member Frances Magarian, the Branch reserve fund, or donated by members and supporters.

Other Fundraising

AAUW National-Level Annual Fund solicits funds for specific programs or to the "greatest needs." Donations are usually made in November and are optional.

- Education & Training Fund - supports STEM, Title IX and Pathways to Jobs
- Economic Security Fund - Pay Equity, Title VII, Retirement Security
- Leadership Fund - Career Workplace Training

History*

There are three levels of AAUW: AAUW National, AAUW California and branches such as AAUW Long Beach. We are members of all three organizations and pay dues to each group.

AAUW National was established in 1881 with 1,000 branches nationwide.

AAUW California is the most active and diverse organization for women in our state, with more than 8,500 members in 108 branches, as well as nearly 2,000 members-at-large.

AAUW Long Beach currently has 120 members and a long and prestigious history beginning in 1920.

1920 – 1940:

A small group of college-educated women formed the College Women's Club of Long Beach in 1911 and became affiliated with the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, the forebear of AAUW. The Branch joined with the League of Women Voters to establish a school for voters. They also created a Toy Loan Library, an Inter-Club Legislature, a city-wide Creative Arts Festival, and a Community Arts Survey. The Branch's focus on education emerged early—in the 1920s members raised money for scholarships.

1941 – 1945:

During WW II, the Branch set up a Speakers Bureau in connection with consumer research, worked with the YWCA in finding rooms for defense workers, bought War Bonds, and along with American Women's Volunteer Service, established and helped furnish and staff, a Servicewomen's Club.

1945 – 1970:

In the post-war years, AAUW-Long Beach conducted a survey of recreational facilities that resulted in supervised playgrounds, updated the Arts Survey of Long Beach, and conducted a study of juvenile problems in Lakewood, resulting in supervised recreation in Pan-American Park. Members began a Braille Transcribing Section that produced hundreds of books for blind students.

1970 – 1995:

In cooperation with other organizations, the Branch developed and presented the first Literary Women's Conferences. Among other contributions to the community, members published *Choosing Childcare: a Directory of Child Care Facilities in Long Beach*. The group successfully raised money for three named EF fellowships during these years.

1995 – 2005:

New activities: members mentored more than fifty middle- and high-school girls; supported Tech Trek scholarships; provided reading tutors for Constellation Middle School; and a Math-Science workshop for middle-school girls. Additionally, the Branch completed another named fellowship and has consistently been one of the leading California donors to the Legal Advocacy Fund.

2005-2025

Continued support of Tech Trek, conducted AAUW Work and Start Smart workshops on negotiating pay and benefits; oversaw STEM Career Conferences for LBUSD Title I middle-school girls; presented \$82,500 in scholarships to LBCC & CSULB students by 2025; created an Investment Policy to ensure the branch's financial security; and completed two more AAUW Research and Projects Endowments. Received the TALB Friend of Education Award for Community Service award; collaborated with the Women's Intercultural Network to advocate for the 2016 ratification by the LB City Council to be a CEDAW city; celebrated its own 100th anniversary in 2020; was recognized by LB Mayor Robert Garcia and the LBCC Board of Trustees for its implementation and 50-year advocacy of Title IX; was a member of the CSULB President's Commission on the Status of Women and advocated for the LB Commission on the Status of Women and Girls.
