Gender Equity for All!

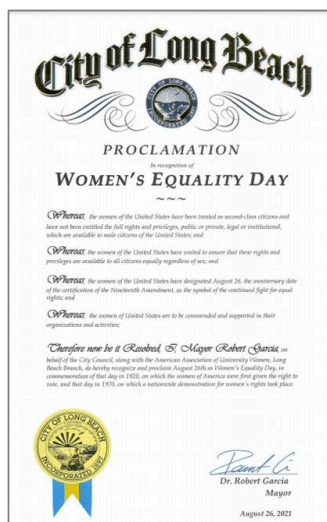

Our February branch meeting will focus on the work of the City of Long Beach Commission on the Status of Women and Girls, a relatively new but highly active advisory body dedicated to advancing gender equity across our city.

Established to advise the Mayor and City Council, the Commission for Women and Girls works to identify and address issues affecting women and girls through research, advocacy, and policy recommendations. Its mission emphasizes improving safety, representation, opportunity, and quality of life for women and girls of all ages and backgrounds, using an intersectional lens that recognizes how race, income, age, ability, immigration status, and other identities shape lived experience.

During the 2024–25 year, the Commission focused on building a strong

foundation for long-term impact while also engaging deeply with pressing community concerns. Commissioners received briefings and testimony from local advocates, nonprofit service providers, City staff, and subject-matter experts on issues including domestic and intimate partner violence, sexual assault and survivor support, human trafficking prevention, mental health and trauma-informed care, early childhood and family supports, economic equity, and housing instability. The Commission also advanced concrete recommendations to City leadership, such as advocating for the City of Long Beach to formally recognize **Women's Equality Day on August 26**.



At the February meeting, we will explore what the Commission has learned in its inaugural year, why its work matters for women and girls in Long Beach, and how community members and organizations like AAUW can stay informed and engaged. We hope you'll join us for this timely and informative discussion.

The Rocky Path to Equal Pay

The recent demolition of the East Wing of the White House – long home to the offices and initiatives of First Ladies – has reignited concern about how women's leadership is preserved in our national memory. While the White House Executive Residence and the National Park Service confirmed that artifacts were archived and a digital record created, the loss of the physical space is still deeply symbolic, raising questions like: Whose contributions are preserved in public view? Whose history is protected, and whose is quietly sidelined? *

Fortunately, many organizations and writers have documented the contributions of women in science, education, and civic life. They bring historical figures to life in creative ways, such as in the 2024 theatrical release of "Suffs". This musical by Shaina Taub makes women's history accessible by presenting the stories of a handful of fearless women who fought to get the right to vote – a mostly ignored tale covering the period of 1913-1920. The song "If We Were Married" touches upon the economic disparities for women in that era when Doris Stevens, a suffragist, sings to President Wilson's chief of staff: "If we were married, my earnings would be in your name, and I couldn't control my own spending or open a bank account or sign a contract or hire a lawyer. Economically speaking, I'd die by becoming your wife."

Washington, D.C. may have been the heart of the suffragist movement, but the fight continued here in Long Beach, too. On **Friday, February 27th** the "Suffragist Bus Tour", narrated by author Gerri Schipske, will bring the inspiring stories of local suffragists to life. Another important date related to economic disparities is **March 4, 2026: Equal Pay Day**. Almost one year ago, on Equal Pay Day 2025, AAUW released its report, [The Not So Simple Truth About the Gender Pay Gap](#), revealing that women working full-time, year-round earned just **83 cents for every dollar earned by men**, down from previous years. The gaps are even larger for women of color, LGBTQ+ women, and women with disabilities.

The **Paycheck Fairness Act** seeks to provide more effective remedies for wage discrimination based on sex and prohibits retaliation against employees who report wage discrimination. This Act was first introduced in 1997 and subsequently reintroduced many times since, only to fail passage in the Senate. Bill champions **Rep. Rosa DeLauro (D-Conn, age 82) and Senator Patty Murray (D-Wash, age 75)** are still up against Business groups that oppose the bill due to fear that employers will face frivolous lawsuits under the proposed requirements; it is stalled in committees for both chambers.

Sign the ERA Petition at www.Sign4ERA.org, founded by Carolyn B. Maloney, Member of Congress, 1993-2023. Although the required number of states have ratified the ERA, a time limit set by Congress has created legal and political debate about whether the amendment can be recognized. AAUW supports the legal argument that the ERA has met all constitutional requirements to become the 28th Amendment.

This year AAUW-CA is introducing a new approach to Lobby Days that prioritizes in-district meetings. Experience from the last two years of Lobby Days in Sacramento revealed that in-person meetings with legislators were increasingly difficult to schedule and were often postponed or even cancelled at the last minute. By contrast, when legislators are in their home districts, they are more likely to respond to requests from constituents for a meeting.

AAUW California's public policy team is tracking bills that support our public policy goals. An AAUW-CA sponsored bill on human trafficking and enforcement, and other bills, will be shared in February. Lobby Days' participants will study them and prepare to advocate for them with our two Legislators:

State Assembly District 69: Assemblyman Josh Lowenthal

State Senate District 33: Senator Lena A. Gonzalez

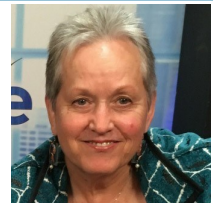

Tech Trek Update

Five Tech Trek campers from 2025 shared their favorite camp experiences in a panel discussion at the January 10th AAUW meeting. The panelists, who are now in the 8th grade, represented three LBUSD middle schools: Mila Cannone, Hughes Middle School; Sally De La Cruz, Powell Academy; Nuuausala Leilua, Powell Academy; Allison Rodriguez, Nelson Academy; and Kayla Torres-Cupa, Nelson Academy.

The January 10 event was also our branch's annual fundraiser for Tech Trek. AAUW Long Beach raised over \$4,000 from the event, based on our deposits as of January 19th. Due to the generosity of our members, we have raised enough funds to cover all 2026 campers.

The Tech Trek Committee requested 12 camperships for 2026: six at UC Santa Barbara and six at Whittier College. Due to an overwhelming number of requests for Whittier College, we were allocated five spots rather than six. We received our requested six camperships at UC Santa Barbara, so we will have a total of 11 campers this summer.

AAUW Long Beach received nominations from six middle schools for Tech Trek 2026. The participating schools this year are Hamilton Middle School, Hughes Middle School, Jefferson Middle School, Muir Academy, Nelson Academy, and Colin Powell Academy. The Tech Trek Committee will interview all campers who have completed their applications by the March 1st deadline. The committee members are Tobi Balma (Website Coordinator), Pat Ferrer (Treasurer), Nicole Gracie (Tech Trek Alumni Coordinator), and Valerie Armstrong (Tech Trek Branch Coordinator). Those selected will be notified by April 1, 2026.

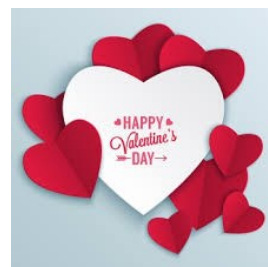
